## Early primary would be good for Michigan

The process of selecting the Democratic and Republican nominees for president is a strange beast. A series of primaries and caucuses, held every four years, are designed to help the two main political parties pick their nominees.
Traditionally, two small states - New Hampshire and lowa - have had a big say in deciding who the nominees will be. Because they hold the first elections, they get to set the tone for the rest of the country. Often times, by the time other states get to vote, the field of nominees has been significantly whittled down, making primary elections meaningless in much of the country.
That's a shame, and that's why so many states are try ing to move up the political ladder by scheduling their primaries and caucuses earlier and earlier.
Among them: Michigan. State leaders in both political parties have been itching to make Michigan a major player in the primary season, and we feel that's a good thing. We'd love to see our state have a larger role in deciding who the Democratic and Republican nominees will be.
But while we applaud the effort that's taking place to move Michigan up on the schedule, we're greatly troubled by much of what we're seeing.
It's a complicated process, but the latest move came Wednesday, when the Michigan Senate voted to move the state's presidential nomination contests to Jan. 15. The problem is that Democrats and Republicans are going to have to come up with some sort of agreement to move this effort forward, and that's easier said than done.
Wednesday's vote in the GOP-controlled Senate was along party lines, meaning the bill is likely going to encounter problems when it hits the Democratic-con trolled House.
Michigan also has to decide whether to hold a primary or a caucus, and we favor a primary, because it's held much like a regular election, and it's by far the most democratic option
According to the Associated Press, though, supporters of Democratic presidential candidate John Edwards are pressing for a caucus instead of a primary in Michigan. Edwards has strong support among unions, whose influence might be magnified in a caucus, where the ability to turn out voters willing to attend party meetings will be critical.
Many party leaders still favor a primary, though, and we hope that's the direction the Democrats choose. We also urge leaders from both political parties to reach an agreement on this, because it will benefit Michigan's voters if the state is able to hold an early primary. And while the Jan. 15 primary was approved by the Senate, we're outraged by one of the provisions in the bill. As approved, voters would have to declare their political party before voting. The problem is that once it's collected, that information would be exempt from the state's Freedom of Information Act.
With one exception: It would be made available to the state party chairs, who would then be able to use the information to send out targeted election advertising. So, the general public won't be able to see who's voting Democratic and who's voting Republican, but the party leaders will? That's outrageous. There should not be political exceptions to the state's FOIA law.
A lot needs to be fixed and agreed upon - and soon -but it's our hope that Michigan's political leaders are able to make us a major player in the 2008 presidential election.
