JUDGE: 'Citizens' protected

■ Developer REIS issued a warning

In the continuing saga of developers REIS and the former Northville Regional Psychiatric Hospital property, Chief Wayne County Circuit Court Judge William Giovan granted Laurie

Marrs' motion for a protective order against REIS last Friday. The order concerned a subpoena and deposition notice to Marrs by REIS attorney Robert Carson, who issued the subpoena recently on behalf of the developers. REIS is a partnership between developers Real Estate Interests Group and Schostak Brothers and Company. The developers failed last year in their attempts to have the plan they wanted approved by township leaders for Highwood, a mixed-use residential and com-

mercial development to be built on the former Northville Regional Psychiatric Hospital property on Seven Mile Road in the township. Afterwards, the developers sued the township in a \$100-million lawsuit, claiming their plan was the only one that was viable.

What subpoena requested

The subpoena requested evidence of communications between Marrs and fellow steering committee member Carol

Poenisch of Citizens for Northville with elected township officials and state legislators. Process servers were unsuccessful in serving papers to Poenisch, although they attempted to several times at her Northville Township home. Last Friday, attorneys for REIS

also presented a motion to Giovan to serve Poenisch by substituted service, such as regular mail, certified mail or posting a copy of the subpoena at her home. But the judge never heard that motion as he had already granted the protective order to both Marrs and Poenisch. The judge said it was "absolutely unnecessary to put these citizens through this aggravation," according to Joseph Xuereb, Marrs' attorney.

THE OTHER RED WINGS

■ Allen Terrace resident once member of Laurium Red Wings

Who knew that a former Red Wings player lives at Northville's Allen Terrace Senior Apartments? He wasn't a member of the Detroit Red Wings, but 91-year-old Mert Brevik of Northville was a member of the Laurium Red Wings Junior Hockey Team in the 1930s. He was a member of the Laurium Red Wings were the Copper Country Junior Champions in 1932-33 before moving to the Metro Detroit area. In 1931-32, the team didn't have an organized league.

Brevik was one of the local senior citizens who attended the Grand Senior Birthday Celebration at the Northville Senior Center on May 14 for local residents 90 years old and older.

He even had a couple of photos of the hockey team to share with attendees of the event and their family members.

The Laurium Red Wings used to be called the Laurium Olympics, just like the Detroit Red Wings used to be called the Detroit Olympics. Brevik played as a forward a good part of his time with the Laurium team but also took on other positions.

He's still a fan of the Detroit Red Wings today.

Upper Peninsula native

Brevik was born and raised in Laurium, a suburb of Calumet in the Upper Peninsula. One of 10 children, his father was head of maintenance for the public school system, which was made up of 32 schools.

When he moved to Michigan, Brevik worked for Burroughs for 40 years, starting as a stock clerk and taking on several different assignments.

Although he's a widow now, he was married to Cecilia, who people called "Jo," for 67 years.

City cuts budget to keep millage rate same

■ Staff acts on mayor's words

Mayor Chris Johnson believes in holding the line when it comes spending.

As such, he suggested during last month's budget talks that the proposed .17 mill increase in the city's millage rate be eliminated for the 2009 budget and that no increase be made in the general fund.

The operating millage will remain at 13.30 mills for the 2009 budget, the same as last year, and the general fund will reflect an overall decrease of 1.34 percent from the current year.

Council adopted the 2009 budget at its May 19 meeting. The budget must be approved by the third Monday in May by city charter.

Council members agreed with the mayor's recommendation to not increase the millage rate, with city staff members directed to make about \$57,000 in budget cuts to deal with the elimination of the millage increase.

"I think we should hold the line on our millage rate," Johnson said at the April 23 meeting. "I think this may also be the year that we

5K Walk Saturday for Pediatric Brain Tumor Research

■ Happy Hearts group forms in honor of late Leah James, 5

For the James family of Livonia, who lost their 5-year-old daughter, Leah, to a pediatric brain tumor in 2005, their wish is

simple: That perhaps in the not too distant future, children diagnosed with brain tumors will be told there is some hope.

To expedite that hope, a 5K walk will be held at Maybury Park at 10 a.m. Saturday, raising funds for pediatric brain tumor research.

The group hosting the event is Leah's Happy Hearts. Karen James, Leah's mother, heads up the group, saying that funds raised will be used for more research and to help with their annual Christmas event for children with life-threatening illnesses at Mott Children's Hospital in Ann Arbor.

Leah was diagnosed with Diffused Pontine Brain Stem Glioma, for which James said there is no known cure. One-hundred children each year are diagnosed with this inoperable tumor, all with the same outcome. Annually, 2,300 youngsters are diagnosed with other types of brain tumors.

"I thought this event would be a memorable way for families to come together in the community and walk for a reason, in Leah's memory," James said. "We're calling it Happy Feet for Happy Hearts 5K Walk."

A Northville fire truck will be

on hand for kids to see and learn about, and the fire department will be handing out hats and pencils. A clown will be giving away balloons to the children, and kids can get a temporary tattoo of Leah's Happy Heart logo.

"One reason I asked for a fire truck, was that Livonia firefighters took a liking to Leah after she was diagnosed. They took her to lunch just before she fell into a coma, and also made her an honorary member. Her casket was carried on one of their fire trucks," James said.

Leah's Happy Hearts is a non-profit organization, and their board consists of 14 members.

Also at the event will be the 'Wall of Courage'. "I belong to several online support groups and contacted many of those families asking if they would allow me to post their child's picture," James said. "It is quite a thing to see."

Leah was known for always saying, "My heart is happy" and inspiring others to be happy. James said Leah was a perfectly healthy child until the age of 4, when to everyone's surprise she was diagnosed within a week of being taken sick with vomiting and experiencing pain at the back of her head.

Leah received radiation treatments at C.S. Mott's Children's Hospital at the University of Michigan.

"It was my faith in God that helped me through this," James said. "I could have gotten mad and walked away from Him, but I turned towards Him. I've also joined a Bible study. My friends have been so supportive and helpful to me as well."

Kylie James, Leah's sister, is 11-years old and a sixth grader at Northville Christian School. James said the school has been very helpful and supportive, encouraging everyone to participate in this upcoming walk.

Charley's Deli Grille in Northville is donating sandwiches for the May 31 event. There also will be plenty of bottled water on hand, James said.

Nancy Hackett, a board member of Leah's Happy Hearts said, "Everyone on the board knew Leah, and this has become a labor of love for all of us."

Event details

A \$6 park entrance fee is charged. The walk, about 3.2 miles, will be held in the park on paved trails, with early registration strongly encouraged, beginning at 8:30 a.m. - rain or shine.

Maybury State Park is located at 20145 Beck, between Seven and Eight-Mile Road.

Registration cost is \$20 for 18 and older, \$10 for 6-17; 5 and under are free. All registrants will receive a T-shirt with Leah's Happy Hearts logo on it.

Online registration and pledge forms are available at leahshappyhearts.org. Those with pledges of \$100 or more will be entered into a drawing for Tiger baseball tickets, or a Nintendo Wii.

Last year a silent auction was held to raise funds, and this year's walk will, according to James, help make people aware of how fast a pediatric brain tumor can take its toll.

"Our lives will never be the same, or feel whole," James said. "I appreciate every day and, more than ever, my daughter Kylie and my husband Phil."

The order relieves both Marrs and Poenisch from the burden of appearing for potentially hours of deposition concerning their discussions about the former Northville Regional Psychiatric Hospital with their elected officials.

Attorneys for REIS filed a response and a six-page brief to the motion for a protective order a few days before last Friday's hearing.

Part of REIS' justification for requesting the depositions was that Marrs and Poenisch "had conversations with state legislators regarding this issue on behalf of their group, Citizens for Northville," Xuereb said, reading from the brief.

"I thought the judge made the right decision," Xuereb said. "He clearly recognized that REIS was attempting to punish these citizens for opposing the developers' annexation attempt." Since the developers were not able to get their plan approved by Northville Township leaders, they moved some people in security trailers onto the property, had them register as voters and are trying to annex the land to neighboring Livonia.

Those residents and Livonia voters will have an annexation proposal on the Aug. 5 primary ballot.

Xuereb asked the court to impose sanctions against the developers because their request to dispose Marrs and Poenisch was not substantially justified. Giovan said based on the record, he would be slow to impose sanctions. But, he did say the developers should consider the granting of the protective order as a warning to not attempt any similar discovery.

"I felt like I was in the center of a crosshair," Poenisch said, after learning that the developers were trying to subpoena her for a deposition. "I felt like I was a target, and I was glad they (REIS) missed the target. I believe a deposition would be a waste of their time and our time as well as the judge's. I have the right to voice publicly my opinion about the (hospital) property and how I feel it should be developed."

Marrs was out of town and not available for comment at press time.

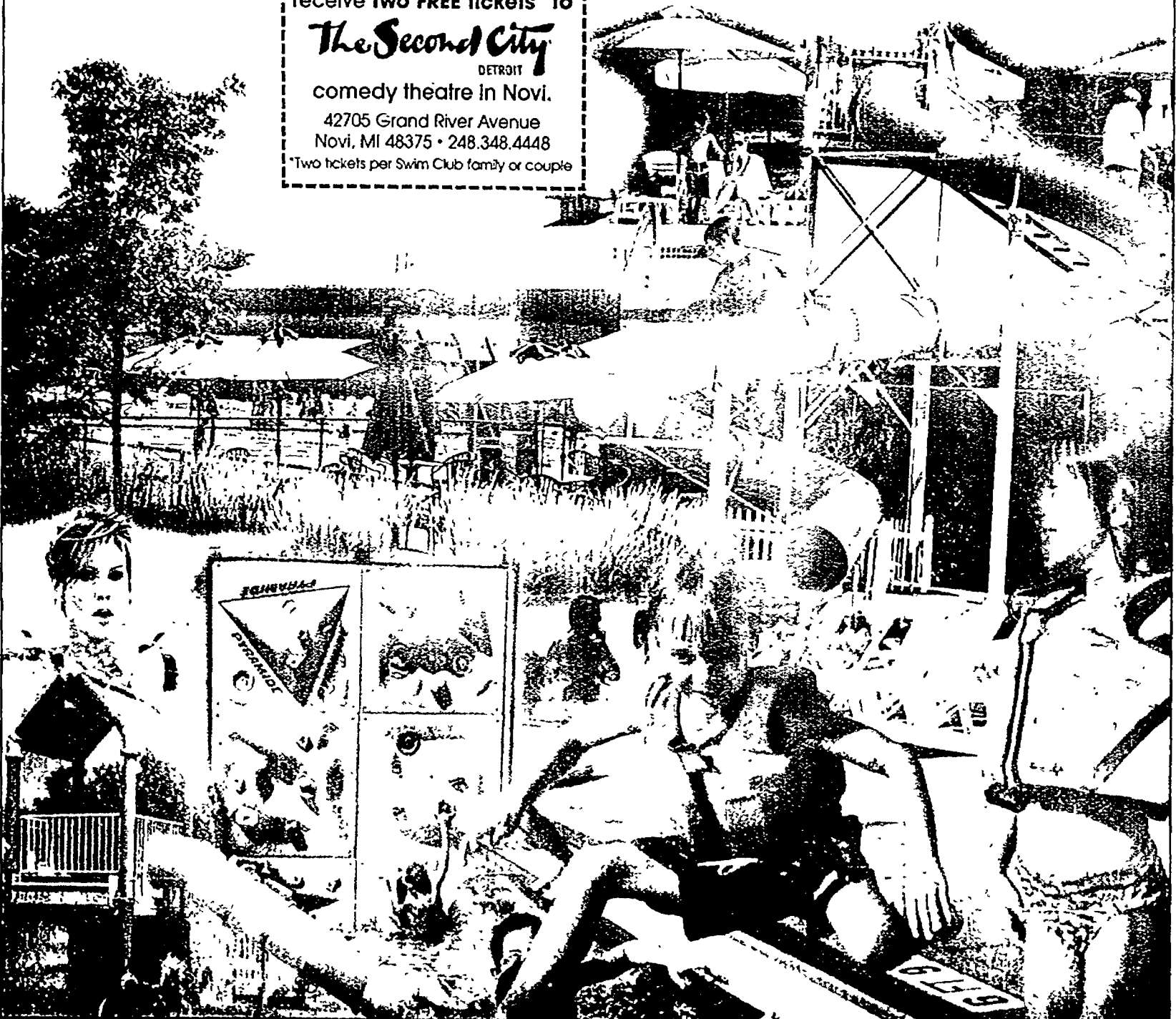

She passed away five years ago at age 83. They had two children, John,

who lives in Northville, and Joan, who resides in Baltimore, Md. He also has five grandchildren and two great-grandchildren

A U.S. Navy veteran, Brevik enlisted and served for two years at the beginning of World War II. "I live for sports," Brevik said. He enjoyed bowling and golf, but baseball and hockey are his favorites. "Those were the ones I

excelled at," he said. One day he won a free trip to the Detroit Tigers Fantasy Camp by answering the following question correctly over the phone: "Who replaced the St. Louis Browns?"

His correct answer? The Baltimore Orioles. "I only had to pay \$100 to take my wife along," he said. "That was the best money I ever spent." Brevik used to walk a lot, but said he started to slow down

about age 88. Even though he appears to be spry for a man in his early 90s, he said he's not as young as he used to be. Or, as he says: "The girls started to pass me by."

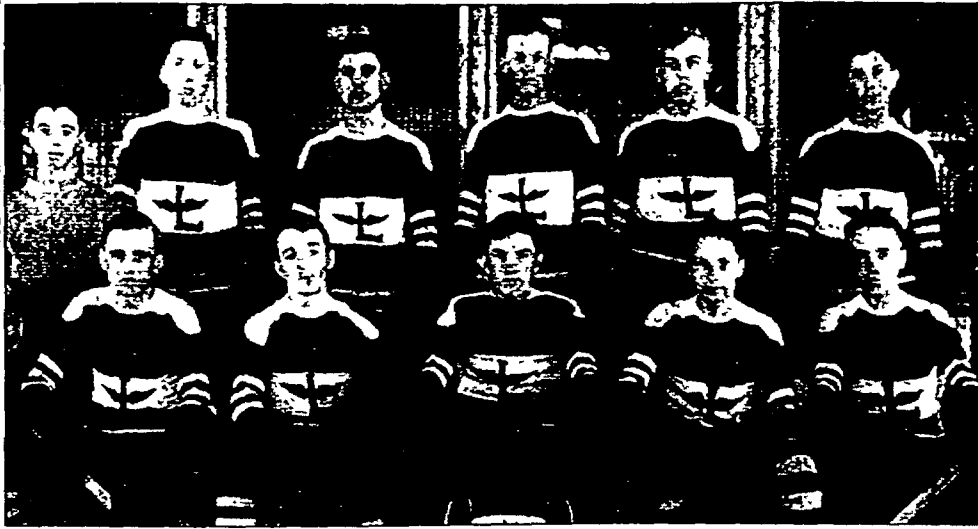

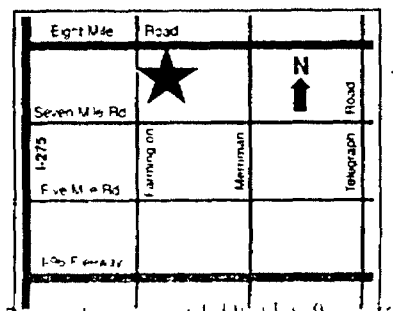

Commissioner Cox wants bike path from township to city

■ But county doesn't see it as a priority

Although she may have a hard time convincing Wayne County road officials, Commissioner Laura Cox would like to see a bike path connecting the

Northville Township to the city of Northville.

Cox appeared at a Northville City Council meeting earlier this month to talk about the proposed project.

She believes a path is needed along Sheldon Road that would connect the city from the intersection of Seven Mile and Sheldon Road south to Six Mile Road in the township.

"The crossing is bad at this intersection, and I think the county needs to address it," she

said at the May 5 council meeting.

"We certainly would support that," said Mayor Chris Johnson. Nancy Darga, a member of both the city council and Northville Parks and Recreation Commission, said the Parks and Recreation Commission recently passed a resolution supporting bike paths connecting the city and the township.

"I believe the lack of bikeways presents a public safety issue," she said. Darga also wants the

gravel parking lot to be paved along Hines Drive where disc golfers and cross country runners often come into contact with each other.

"I really would like to see some of these repairs made before improvements are made," she added.

Cox said she will keep pushing for the bike path leading up to Seven Mile Road on Sheldon.

"The county doesn't love this

project, but I don't care, because I think it's needed," she told council.

Doug Bingham, council member, said he thinks bicyclists from the township would like to come to the city via this route.

"It would bring more people to the downtown area," Bingham said.

Cox said one area of the proposed path would require a bridge over some water, which would

add some cost to the project.

For residents who would like to discuss the bike path issue or other issues in the county with Cox can find her at the Northville District Library from 10 a.m. to noon on Wednesday, June 25.

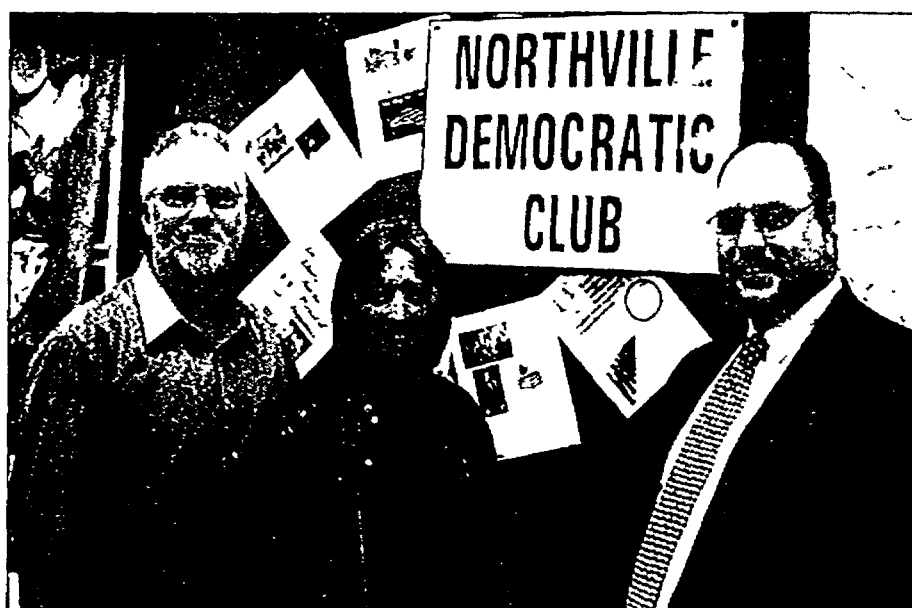

■ City budget cut to keep same millage

don't contribute to our fund balance and make some cutbacks. We cannot spend more than we have."

"If we don't make cuts now, we'll regret it later," said Nancy Darga, member of city council.

One reason Johnson wanted to hold the millage rate was because an increase in the rate has a bit of a negative influence on the city's bond rating, which could affect the interest rate on city bonds.

"One of the things the city has done over the last few years is to keep its bond rating high," Johnson said. "Plus, we have a fund balance that is historically at an all-time high."

The city has about an \$18-million budget for 2009, with about \$6.5 million in its general fund.

As of June 30, 2007, the general fund had a fund balance of \$2,336,689. Bateson explained that this can be explained as what the city has in its savings account at the end of the year.

Preserving the fund balance is important to mitigate further revenue reductions beyond the city's control.

Johnson went on to say that the city needs to look at its energy costs and how every department is staffed.

"We need to look at everything we do and ask, 'Why do we do it?'" he said. "We've got to be on a pay-as-you-go program."

Following the April 23 meeting, Nickie Bateson, city finance director, and Pat Sullivan, city manager, asked all departments to go back and review their budgets with cost-cutting in mind.

"Everybody chipped in," Bateson said.

Some training expenses were cut from the fire department, the parks and recreation department

and the city clerk's office. Other cuts included proposed capital outlay expenses in the police department.

"As far as the impact to the taxpayers, they won't see any changes in the level of service," Bateson said.

The police department had requested an administrative vehicle that was cut for a savings of about \$20,000. Another \$20,000 was cut from money scheduled to go into the fund balance reserve.

The remaining \$17,000 in cuts was for more incidental items, such as the cost of a new postage machine scheduled to be replaced because of new postal regulations.

Bateson said the initial quote was about \$10,000 to replace the machine. A new quote was acquired, however, which brought that total down to \$7,000. She said the postal service is working with customers to bring down added costs due to the new regulations.

"These changes will make the

post office more efficient," Bateson said. Some mandatory requirements from the new postal regulations will begin in January 2009.

"We're embarking on a whole new era because we're going to continue to see a decline in property tax values, and that's our major source of revenue," Bateson said. Major costs for the city include personnel and capital improvements.

"Capital improvements can sometimes be delayed or planned out over time," she said. "With personnel costs, our concern is the rising costs of benefits, which will continue to increase, while our major sources of revenue decrease."

The state budget also has many concerns, which affects the local budget.

Although state shared revenue is the second largest source of revenue in the city's general fund, it represents only 3.2 percent of total revenue sources.

Trio of Girl Scouts goes for the "gold"

■ 3 Northville seniors have been together in organization since they were in kindergarten

The lives of three Northville Girl Scouts from troop 1570 intertwine in more ways than one. The three girls are seniors at Northville High School and have been in Girl Scouts since they were 4 and 5 years old.

All three were presented with the Girl Scout Gold Award at an awards ceremony held May 13 at Lydia Mendelssohn Theatre at the University of Michigan. And, to top it off, all three will attend U of M in the fall. How's that for commonality?

"The girls were thrilled when our state rep, Marc Cornveau, showed up at the ceremony," said troop leader Nancy Czerwinski.

The Gold Award is the highest award a 14-17 year-old Girl Scout can earn. Nearly 7,500 girls in the Huron Valley Council started Girl Scouts in kinder-

garten. Out of that number, 20 girls continued scouts in high school, earning the gold award.

Going for the "gold" involves 65 hours of work in the community using organizational, leadership and networking skills.

Robin Czerwinski, a senior at Northville High School (and daughter of the troop leader), put in her 65 hours at Mott Children's Hospital in Ann Arbor. Last year, on Monday nights, she taught 50 patients, ages 4-17, how to play the penny whistle, an Irish traditional folk instrument similar to the recorder except made of tin. Czerwinski gave each patient a penny whistle, and instrument case (sewn by Junior Girl Scouts), a music book and a bookmark (decorated by Brownie Girl Scouts). The kids learned to play their new instruments in one-on-one hour-long sessions with Czerwinski and then kept their instruments to practice and enjoy.

Czerwinski even made a DVD on how to play the penny whistle and left it with the hospital for future patients to watch and learn. She raised most of the money to buy the instruments through Girl Scout Cookie sales and a bottle drive.

Czerwinski has 13 years of Girl Scouts behind her and hopes to be a Girl Scout Camp coun-

selor in College.

NHS senior Joy Lerner ran art workshops for seniors at independent and assisted living centers at Winwood, Allen Terrace and Villa Marie. Twice a month, Lerner made arts and crafts projects with seniors who not only exercised their art skills, but enjoyed the social interaction that crafting brings. Lerner kept her class busy with projects that included decorating a wreath with fabric flowers, decorating holiday cards with stamps and ink, painting pumpkins and weaving palm crosses. Their final project was an angel made out of silk flowers.

Lerner has been in Girl Scouts 10 years and plans to continue her journey in college and beyond.

"Girl scouting doesn't really end when you graduate college," said Lerner. "Some colleges have Girl Scouts on campus who work with younger troops as role models."

Jackie Turner spent her 65 hours creating a literary magazine that showcases the writing talent of her fellow NHS students. Turner saw a void in the area of writing when the school discontinued its newspaper two years ago, due in part to the students getting their daily dose of news from the school's broadcast

network.

She organized a staff, raised funds through advertising sales, found a publisher, edited entries and supervised graphics. Students submitted poetry, drawings, short stories and photography. The first edition of *Cavalcade* debuted in January, the second arrived last week.

The Big Campus

Czerwinski will be in an honors program at U of M where she will study environmental science.

"That came from all the Girl Scouts camping," she said.

Lerner will go into pre-med at U of M.

"I really like the sciences,"

said Lerner. "I want to help people."

And Turner will study film at U of M.

No matter where the road forks for these three scouts, one thing is certain - they will always have the Girl Scout Law planted firmly in their hearts.

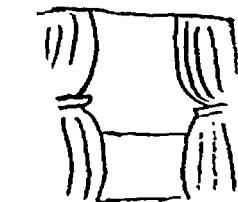

Rising pump prices no match for Christian volunteers

Same trip costs 40 percent more this year

Rising gasoline prices aren't stopping 95 volunteers of the First United Methodist Church of Northville from participating in this year's Appalachia Service Project (ASP).

The group will be driving to Lee County, Va., in rented passenger vans to repair homes and bond with families they haven't met and don't know. The missionary trip is set for June 29, with 25 adults and 70 youth signed up.

Giving up one week of their summer, the area group is joining with thousands of others from around the country to perform volunteer work on homes throughout Kentucky, Tennessee, Virginia, and West Virginia.

Mike Needham and Heather Wallas, members of the church on Eight Mile near Taft, have served together as co-leaders of the church's ASP volunteers since 2001.

"Gas will be about \$8,000 of our budget this year," Needham said. "We are renting 12 large passenger vans with each one carrying six youth and two adults, their clothes, sleeping gear, food, tools, and other cargo. We figure it's a round trip of 1,500 miles, getting 12-miles per gallon, amounting to 18,000 miles total for all the vans."

Last year, their gas expenses were 40 percent less for the same destination. If gas prices rise much higher before next month, Wallas says they'll have to ask for a special offering from the

congregation or from the families going on the trip.

"This past month we raised \$10,000, selling our Spirit Dove cutout for \$10 each. That was our final push to cover gasoline expenses - figuring on \$4 a gallon," said Wallas, who also serves as the Christian Education Director at the church.

Cost per person this year was \$500, cut in half by fundraisers. Both co-leaders agree, from personal experience, the rewards will far outweigh the cost.

"What these kids see and do in that one week will change their life," Needham explained, noting that the monthly average income for some families in Lee County

might only be \$200 a month.

The group will be putting on new roofs, insulating walls, and building handicap ramps. Volunteers pay for many of the materials, with some being donated. All the materials are purchased in the town they are working in.

Headquartered in Johnson City, Tenn., ASP Christian ministry is committed to making homes warmer, safer, and dryer. This year over 400 churches and 18,000 youth will be involved in the summer program.

"I went on my first trip in 1976," Wallas said. "This year, my 14-year-old son, A.J., is going for the first time."

She recalls one incident that affected her priorities.

"We were in a flood zone one year, and a mother and her kids were cleaning out their house, making sandbags, and had just gotten the home back to normal and even salvaged some of the furniture. But suddenly more rains came, and it was torrential. It came so fast and furiously they couldn't sandbag fast enough to save their house."

"As her kids were crying, the mom said to them, I don't know why you're crying? Have you ever seen a U-haul following a hearse? She had her arms around the family and they were all safe. To her that was the most important thing, it wasn't about what they had lost. I thought that was everything I needed to know," Wallas said.

Aside from the repairs, a unique spiritual and emotional bond is developed between the family and the volunteers, according to Needham.

"Every morning we drive from our facility center to the home we're working on. We give up the luxuries we have in our lives to work on their house. We say prayers together; we eat our lunches together and really get to know one another. By the end of the week when we leave there are lots of tears and hugs," he said.

The Northville volunteers will break up into groups and work on 12 homes during their stay. They will be sharing their trip experiences during the July 6 morning church service.

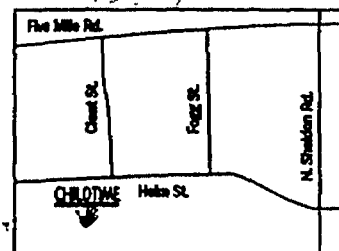

Northville psychologists duo teams up as radio "edu-tainers"

■ Majcher and DiPaulo on air 6-7 p.m. Sunday

Northville psychologists Dr. Gail Majcher and Mary DiPaulo, M.A., LLP met when both were leading support groups at their church. Little did they know they grew up in the same town, went to the same high school and obtained their undergraduate degrees from the same university.

The chemistry was instant, and both had a feeling they would someday work together. In no time, the two were planning a radio show to broadcast their expertise and spicy humor.

Now they are hosts of Detroit's first all-female radio show, "Sunday Services" (WJR-760AM) debuted on Super Bowl Sunday and airs Sundays from 6-7 p.m. with moderator Rachel Nevada. Majcher and DiPaulo hope to take live callers soon, but for now the "edu-tainers" answer questions from e-mails. "We did not expect it to happen at this time, but the planets aligned and here we are!" said DiPaulo.

"We were just put on air with no training," said Majcher. "We have two very different personalities – if we had similar personalities, it wouldn't work."

"Yeah," said DiPaulo. "Gail is highly grace-focused with people and I am, but not so much. Gail sees the best in situations and I'm like, 'What's going on underneath?'" Though the differences in personality are clear, both hosts share a dichotomy of compassion and a no-nonsense approach.

"Sunday Services" covers psychological topics that affect everyday lives, from annoying spousal habits to domestic violence. A recent show addressed the topic of adults moving back home. A 33-year-old man, who had lost his job, emailed the show asking how he could move back into his parent's home and still maintain his independence.

The hosts suggested the man and his parents – who, by the way, were not excited about his homecoming – sign a contract outlining the rules of the house.

"The adult child needs to be working full-time and have a savings plan. He needs to be paying rent and has to give the same level of consideration as a roommate," said DiPaulo. If the rules of the contract are broken, the boomeranger has 30 days to move out.

This has become a recent hot topic as the nation is seeing the

first wave of boomerangers – those born between 1977 and 1986 – who come back home to live. Majcher said that an enforced contract in these situations is important because boomerangers can easily revert back emotionally to a time when they were 15-16-years-old.

Another hot topic the show has explored is person addiction, also known as co-dependency. The question was what does it mean to be addicted to a person? Majcher, or Dr. Gail as she is known on the show, said, "If a relationship is impacting your life in a negative way and you keep going back, then you know you're addicted."

"As a dog returns to his vomit, so does a fool return to his folly," said DiPaulo, quoting a verse from the Bible. "You think that person is your God, and you can't make another person your God or you're gonna tank."

The spunky hosts explained that the one addicted is usually the giver and will do anything to keep the relationship alive. And the taker has a slave. A master/slave relationship could actually flip flop – one could be the master for awhile and switch to the slave.

Their backgrounds

Majcher has been in private practice for 25 years and specializes in couples counseling, as well as anxiety and depression issues. She works with patients on all issues from teenagers on up.

Majcher received her Ph.D. in clinical and educational psychology from Wayne State University.

"As far back as I can remember, I was the one everyone came to even when I was a kid," she said. "I have a fascination

with psychology."

Majcher hit her high notes when she worked with attorney Noel Keane to open the state's first adoption agency in the late 1980's. Her self-help book, "A Worthy Woman," provides readers and victims of abuse a true story of victory over domestic violence.

"Eighty-five percent (of abusers) are men, but we can't forget the 15 percent of women," said Majcher. "We think the number is actually higher because men don't talk – they're ashamed. In either case, Majcher uses a zero tolerance approach."

A University of Michigan undergrad, DiPaulo pursued a career in marketing. At the age of 40, she went back to school and now has her masters in counseling and psychology from Michigan Theological Seminary in Plymouth.

"I was always an armchair therapist, even as a kid," DiPaulo said. "I've been doing this for free all along anyway."

DiPaulo refers to her switch in careers as a "Godsidence" instead of a coincidence. Her practice is focused on trauma recovery – survivors of homicide and suicide. DiPaulo's clients range from 3 to 93 years old and have post traumatic stress disorder, sex abuse issues, or anxiety spectrum disorders such as generalized anxiety, obsessive mood personality, borderline personality disorder and cutting.

"I'm known for the heavy stuff," said DiPaulo.

Local veterans preparing for honor flight

Hoppy Hanson has been waiting to visit the World War II memorial in Washington, D.C. and now he's getting his chance.

As a war veteran, Hanson, 83, said it's an honor to have a memorial solely for those who served in World War II.

"I've seen the Vietnam and Korean memorials, but haven't made it out to see the World War II memorial yet," Hanson said. "It took a while to get a World War II memorial. It's almost as if it were forgotten."

"World War II affected everyone in the country at that time and it's great to be able to see what this memorial will be."

Hanson, along with 41 other World War II veterans from Fox Run, in Novi, are taking a trip to Washington in the next few months courtesy of Honor Flight, Inc., a non-profit organization formed to raise funds to send all World War II veterans from Michigan to see their monument free of charge.

Hanson, who joined the Navy at 18, flew fighter jets off aircraft carriers during both World War II and the Korean War. He spent 22 years in the Navy and helps spread his patriotism to fellow neighbors currently at Fox Run.

"This is a great opportunity and we thank Honor Flight for giving us vets a chance to see the memorial," he said. "We're all going to be together, and I'm excited to go."

Melissa Downey, fundraising coordinator for Honor Flight Michigan, said the majority of the veterans who have visited

the memorial so far have not spoken about the war prior to their visit.

"A lot of families said they have never spoken about it all these years. They came home, got jobs, married and never spoke of the war except for when they go to the monument," Downey said. "It's wonderful to see the joy and pride on their faces when they get there."

Last year, Honor Flight, started by David and Carole Cameron of West Bloomfield, sent 414 Michigan veterans to see the memorial, which was completed in 2004.

Downey said the hardest obstacle with Honor Flight has been raising money to send vets to see the memorial.

"The problem we're having is we have 900 vets on a waiting list and still no government funding or support," she said. "We fly the vets there and fly them home. It's \$350 per veteran."

Downey said, money aside, it's still a great feeling to see how happy the veterans are when they see the memorial for the first time. "Every dime we make is from our grassroots efforts and fundraisers," she said. "It's definitely tough, but well worth it. We just hope for more support in the future."

Downey said there are currently 15 flights schedule to take Michigan veterans to Washington to see the memorial this year.

Honor Flight schedules the event, provides guardians and assistants to help people with disabilities helps guide veterans through security and provides medical assistance if needed.

Downey said she just wants to

make sure everyone who wants to see the memorial has the opportunity. She said the nation loses 1,200 to 1,500 World War II veter-

ans a day. "Our World War II vets are well into their 80s and 90s now, and I'm afraid we're going to run out

of time and funds before we can take every one that wants to go," she said. "Our goal is to send as many veterans as possible and all

the help we can get will be greatly appreciated. These veterans are our national treasures and they deserve it."

Suspending gas tax a bad idea

You want an example of political pandering at its most basic? Look no further than the ridiculous "gas tax holiday" idea being promoted by two of the remaining major-party candidates for president: Republican Sen. John McCain, R-Ariz., and Democratic Sen. Hillary Rodham Clinton, D-N.Y.

A similar measure is being considered in Michigan's legislature, too.

McCain and Clinton are both strongly supporting the idea of suspending the federal gas tax (18.4 cents a gallon) over the summer. With gas approaching \$4 a gallon, they apparently feel the voters will strongly embrace the idea. Of the presidential candidates, only Democratic Sen. Barack Obama, D-Ill., opposes the idea, correctly calling it a "political gimmick."

This "gas tax holiday" idea is bad policy and bad economics, and despite the fact that virtually every economist in the country opposes it, McCain and Clinton are steadfast in their support.

Speaking to a group in Ohio recently, McCain said, "I'd like to see families in America have a relief from ever-increasing costs of gasoline, so maybe at the end of the summer after this tax holiday they could buy school supplies for their children as they start the school year."

Clinton, meanwhile, was asked by ABC's George Stephanopoulos to name "a credible economist who supports the suspension," and she responded that she doesn't really care what economists think. "We've got to get out of this mindset where somehow elite opinion is always on the side of doing things that really disadvantage the vast majority of Americans," Clinton said.

This suspension of the federal gas tax is a bad idea on so many levels, it's hard to know where to begin. But the arguments against it include these:

- The money raised by the federal gas tax helps fund badly-needed highway projects throughout the country. It's estimated that the tax holiday will cause \$8.5 billion in highway funds to be lost nationwide. Roads will get worse and many road workers will suffer — all so that people can save 18.4 cents a gallon this summer.

Much of the money generated by the state gas tax funds Michigan's School Aid fund.

- Any solution to the gas crunch has to include saving gas by driving less, driving more efficiently and driving more fuel-efficient cars. Having the federal government step in with this gas tax holiday just gives people less incentive to embrace these measures.

- Gas tax holidays don't work. States have tried them in the past, and in every case, the reduction in the price of gas for drivers wasn't consistent with the amount of tax suspended. Instead, the average driver only saved about half of the amount of the tax suspension because retailers are not required to pass the savings onto their customers. If the tax goes down 18 cents, there's nothing stopping a retailer from adding that 18 cents right back to the cost of the gas — and pocketing the additional money.

- With gas hitting \$4 a gallon, a savings of 18.4 cents isn't significant enough to outweigh all the problems a tax holiday would cause.

McCain and Clinton are obviously pushing this idea to curry favor with voters who are weary of paying so much for gas. This pandering is incredibly transparent, and thankfully, it appears the voters are smart enough to see this gimmick for what it is.

Some pundits are arguing that it's no coincidence that Clinton's support of a gas tax holiday was followed by her less-than-spectacular showings in the Indiana and North Carolina primaries. Clearly, the voters weren't swayed by her support of this plan.

We're hoping that McCain and Clinton drop their vocal support of this idea. As they're discovering, the idea of a gas tax holiday is not just bad policy and bad economics — it's bad politics.

Sex ed hearing tonight

Come to the Public Hearing tonight at 7:30 regarding the proposed high school sex ed curriculum, at the Forum in Hillside Middle School. You may still review the materials 1:15-3:45 p.m. today; call (248) 344-8467. The binder will be available at the Public Hearing tonight. I can loan out the Council of PTAs' copy, if not in use by the Council. For a limited time, I have access to two of the four videos (Sex Smart, and the so-called abstinence video).

Does the makeup of the Health Advisory Board (HAB) mirror the community? What percent of the HAB opposes the binder Healthy and Responsible Relationships or the birth control video? From the community survey, no less than 20 or 21% of parents would oppose the binder and videos, with both condoms and contraception. I believe double that number would oppose this particular binder and the videos because they normalize teen sex, and they present latex and contraceptives with inadequate attention to serious side effects and limitations. Check the HAB minutes for yourself. See what percent of the HAB opposed some of these items. You can request to see the minutes at the School Board Bldg., third floor.

Medically, the binder is repeatedly inconsistent. For example, the Student Handout, p.70, states, "The effectiveness of latex or polyurethane condoms for genital warts is unknown." Yet Student Handout, p.89, says HPV is spread "Through unprotected vaginal, oral, or anal intercourse...." Even handouts do not consistently tell our kids that condoms have not been proven to work for this virus that causes cervical cancer!

If the District's mission is excellence "in partnership with parents", why have a policy which limits what HAB members may share to the contents of the approved minutes and what the HAB has approved to share? Shouldn't I be able to share my concerns about the proportion of parents voting against a curriculum item, or my concerns about the so-called "consensus" process, either with the Council of PTAs or with another parent

or doctor in the community?

At the last Public Hearing, Helen Crown, a local abstinence educator, offered to help the District craft a program like that of Ann Arbor schools, a faith-based alternative (outside of school hours) which would cost the District nothing. In addition, there are much better tools to teach abstinence. I also have some of these, if you or your group would like to see them. (Contact dmancycouch@pol.net)

Senior center funds

The headline on the front page column of the May 22 Northville Record regarding the Northville Senior Center donation money ("\$101,017 of senior center's donations paid to township") was quite misleading. Yes, there was agreement at the May 14 Northville Parks and Recreation meeting to transfer \$101,017 from the Northville Senior Community Center Fund Balance to Northville Township, but this was not donation money. This money represented the amount the Senior Center construction project was under budget. These savings were rightfully returned to the Township. No donation money was involved.

The \$22,000 that was noted as staying in the Senior Center Capital Outlay Fund is the remaining balance of the money donated to the Senior Center as part of the donation program. Approximately, \$110,000 in private donations were contributed. The donated funds that were spent to date were used for items to make the Senior Center a special place and ensure the facility was well equipped and well furnished for the Northville community's seniors. These items were over and above what was in the basic project which was funded by the City and the Township. Examples include: living room furniture, sound system, lamps, video equipment, and numerous other furnishings.

Part of the confusion regarding the funds and fund balance was due to the co-mingling of funds in the Northville Senior Center Fund Balance account. It included both the under budget funds and the remainder of the donated funds. With the transfer of the under budget funds out of the account and to the Township, the Fund Balance

now reflects just the donated funds.

A more appropriate headline would have been: "\$101,017 of senior center's under budget project funds paid to township". This is a "good news" story. The original senior center project was under budget by over \$101,000!! How often does something like that happen?

The Holocaust – evil we must never forget

Yom Hashoah, or Holocaust Remembrance Day, has recently passed. This year, the Yom Hashoah was observed on May 1.

So why, you ask, am I writing about it now if this day of remembrance has passed? Because as a nation and a world we must never let this evil act against humanity ever be forgotten.

Yom Hashoah is a day set aside to remember the people who died as well as those who miraculously survived the Holocaust – one of the darkest and most inhumane periods of the 20th century, a time of state-organized persecution and systematic murder.

Holocaust is the word historically used to describe the genocide of approximately six million Jews during World War II. It was part of a program of deliberate extermination, planned and executed by the Nazis under the evil rule of Adolf Hitler. Aside from the Jews, gypsies, Poles, homosexuals and disabled persons perished, too. These groups of people, along with the Jews, were targeted by Hitler because in his eyes they were not part of the "Aryan race."

The Holocaust covered multiple years of suffering, death, cruelty, and terror. Multiple atrocities occurred almost daily from 1941 through 1945. Those who managed to survive were scarred for life. Some still live to tell the stories.

When discussing this horrible act against all that is good in the world, I was struck when my friend said, "I can't believe it has been 60 years ago that this evil took place." Only 60 years ago this type of horror was taking place against our fellow man, I thought. How could such evil

exist in the "modern" world, I wondered.

My mind recoiled as I envisioned how horrible an act this was and then thought of the evil that still exists today in many communities where terror and hatred reign – among them Myanmar, Darfur, Rwanda and other places in Asia and Africa.

Ways to remember

Adjacent to the National Mall in my hometown of Washington, D.C. is the United States Holocaust Memorial Museum. The museum is dedicated to interpreting, studying and documenting the history of the Holocaust. It serves as the United States' official memorial to the millions of Jews and others killed under Nazi directives. The museum is the home of a number of artifacts, exhibitions, artworks and publications relating to the Holocaust.

One of the most moving exhibits at the Museum is "Daniel's House." The exhibit follows the life of a young boy, Daniel, and his family through the ghastly Holocaust years. Ten years of evil are condensed into four small, interconnected rooms. The exhibit pulls on your various senses to suck you deep into the psychological terror that existed during this time. No one can walk through this exhibit with a dry eye and a callous heart. This experience for me was very personal as my son is named Daniel. I could not bear to think of the terror he or I would have experienced if we were Jewish and living in Germany during this time.

As difficult on the heart and mind as this museum and exhibit are, they are musts if we are to provide an emotional and intel-

lectual anchor to what has taken place in the past and vow to do what we can to make sure it never happens again.

Closer to home, on Orchard Lake Road just north of 12 Mile Road in Farmington Hills, is the Holocaust Memorial Center (www.holocaustcenter.org). This unique museum, open to the public, documents the horror of the Holocaust and events leading up to it. Further, it preserves a wealth of Jewish culture and history and serves as a comprehensive research and resource center. The Center is closed on Saturdays and Jewish and legal holidays.

The Holocaust Memorial Center's stated objectives are to:

- Preserve the memory of the 6,000,000 Jews murdered in the Holocaust.

- Preserve the history of the 5,000 Jewish communities wiped out by the Nazis.

- Record the apathy of the many that did nothing and to honor those who risked their lives to save Jews.

- Recall the cultural, social, and religious richness of Jewish life in Europe prior to the Holocaust.

- Record the terror of the Nazi Holocaust and the events that led to it.

- Help future generations

understand and direct their lives to the maintenance of an open, free society.

- Nourish a social consciousness whereby the righteous acts of the few become the standard of the many.

With all that is documented and all that I have heard and seen, the Holocaust reminder that haunts me the most is seeing Jews with a number tattooed on their forearm as a form of a brand that Nazis etched on them to mark and condemn them as something less than human. That they managed against all odds to survive and are able to tell the world of the horror they experienced and witnessed is a blessing for them, their families and all of humanity.

When you look up "evil" in a dictionary, you should find "Holocaust." The Holocaust means that evil can triumph over good if we allow it by choosing to look the other way. We owe it not only to the Holocaust victims to remember what happened, but to all people now living, and to all those yet to be born so that they, too, will understand.

In remembrance there is hope. May we always remember so that this evil may never ever happen again.

Track, tennis head to state meet this weekend

When Scott Szukaitis started the season, he knew his boys track team had a strong contingent of hurdlers.

But last Thursday's regional meet proved it to him.

Cavan Corcoran won the 300-meter intermediate hurdles in 37.70, the top time of anyone at any regional meet.

Corcoran blew the field away, but when Arastu finished, Szukaitis looked at his watch and thought he had started it late. Once he met with his assistant and realized the times were similar, Szukaitis knew Arastu was in.

That left only Gerish on the bubble.

Szukaitis found from another assistant who said Gerish made the cut, and the celebration was on.

"When Corcoran crossed the line, I didn't think there was much of a chance for Ali to qualify," Szukaitis said. "Not only did he qualify, but he qualified by a long ways."

"Evan ran so much better than

we could've hoped for."

Different runners

While all three run and qualified in the same event, they each bring a different style to the track.

Corcoran would be the car with the big engine that pours on the speed as the race gets long.

Arastu is the fastest on a flat track, but is improving with each race.

Gerish is the quarterhorse, or quickest one out of the gate.

Szukaitis said if the three of them competed in different races, Corcoran would win the 400 meters, Arastu would win the 200 meters and Gerish would win the 40 meters.

But all three of them got better

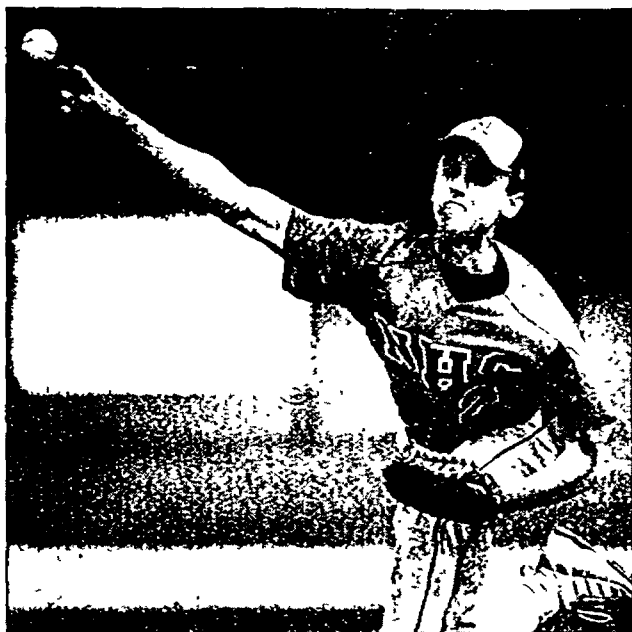

Luckily for him, those plans didn't have to go into action.

Sarah Stern knocked home a point-blank feed from Theresa Yankovich with 16:32 left in the game for a 1-0 lead.

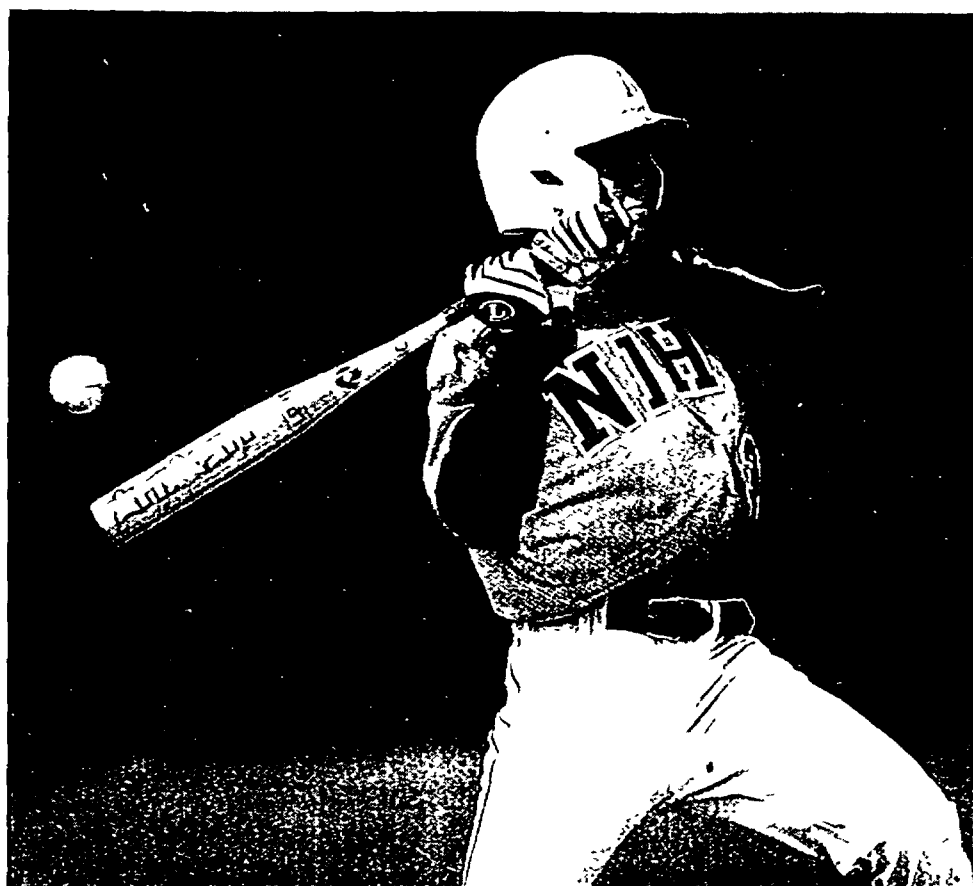

Ronald McDonald is about more than just bright red hair, a yellow jumpsuit and larger-than-life shoes.

The clown, who serves as the mascot and Chief Happiness Officer for the McDonald's Corporation and Ronald McDonald House Charities, puts smiles on the faces of children across the world, including students at Old Village School in downtown Northville.

Last Friday, the costumed character was one of several representatives from Ronald McDonald House Charities of

Students from each of the 12 classes at Old Village School presented special thank-you cards, posters and other creative items to Gaidica and the Ronald McDonald House Charities representatives during the May 23

presentation ceremony.

Randy and Joanne Johnson's 12-year-old son, Randy, is a student in the Severely Cognitively Impaired program at the school. Joanne Johnson was instrumental in obtaining the grant for the school and attended the check presentation at the school last Friday.

"I would especially like to thank Mrs. Johnson," Fischer said. "She is the one who did all the leg work for the grant."

"We're extremely grateful to the Ronald McDonald House Charities and to Chuck Gaidica for their support of the school," she said.
