#### ■ Time to move on with project

Northville Township Supervisor Mark Abbo couldn't say thank you enough to those involved in thwarting the recent attempted annexation of 414 acres of the township to the city of Livonia.

Abbo expressed his gratitude at the monthly township board meeting Thursday evening at

township hall.

About 50 minutes at the start of the meeting was devoted to discussion of the annexation ballot question, which failed in the Aug. 5 primary election.

The question appeared on the ballot after developer REIS placed

seven people on the acreage, the former Northville Regional

Psychiatric Hospital property, had them register as voters and file a petition to have the land annexed to Livonia.

The developer placed the people on the property under the guise of them providing security to the property. This occurred after REIS, a partnership between Real Estate Interests Group and Schostak Brothers and Company, was not pleased with the township-approved plan for the development, Highwood. The developer sued the township for \$100 million, but reached an agreement with the township on the property on July

30, dissolving the lawsuit.

Carol Poenisch of the Stop the Annexation ballot question committee took the podium first, giving a brief chronological account of the anti-annexation campaign.

She talked about Laurie Marrs, of Citizens for Northville, who moderated a town hall meeting on March 6 at the Highland Lakes Condominiums complex clubhouse, where a large crowd gathered to hear about what the developer was proposing, which was not in line with the township's ordinances.

In April, there was a great effort

to try to obtain the passage of annexation reform legislation in the state which would have stopped the annexation. This included the delivery of more than 3,000 signed letters to the Michigan Senate.

The anti-annexation campaign kicked into full throttle in June.

"We had volunteers working in many directions," Poenisch said, including going door-to-door talking to Livonia residents, distributing yard signs, staging a rally during the Livonia Spree festival and attending a breakfast during the

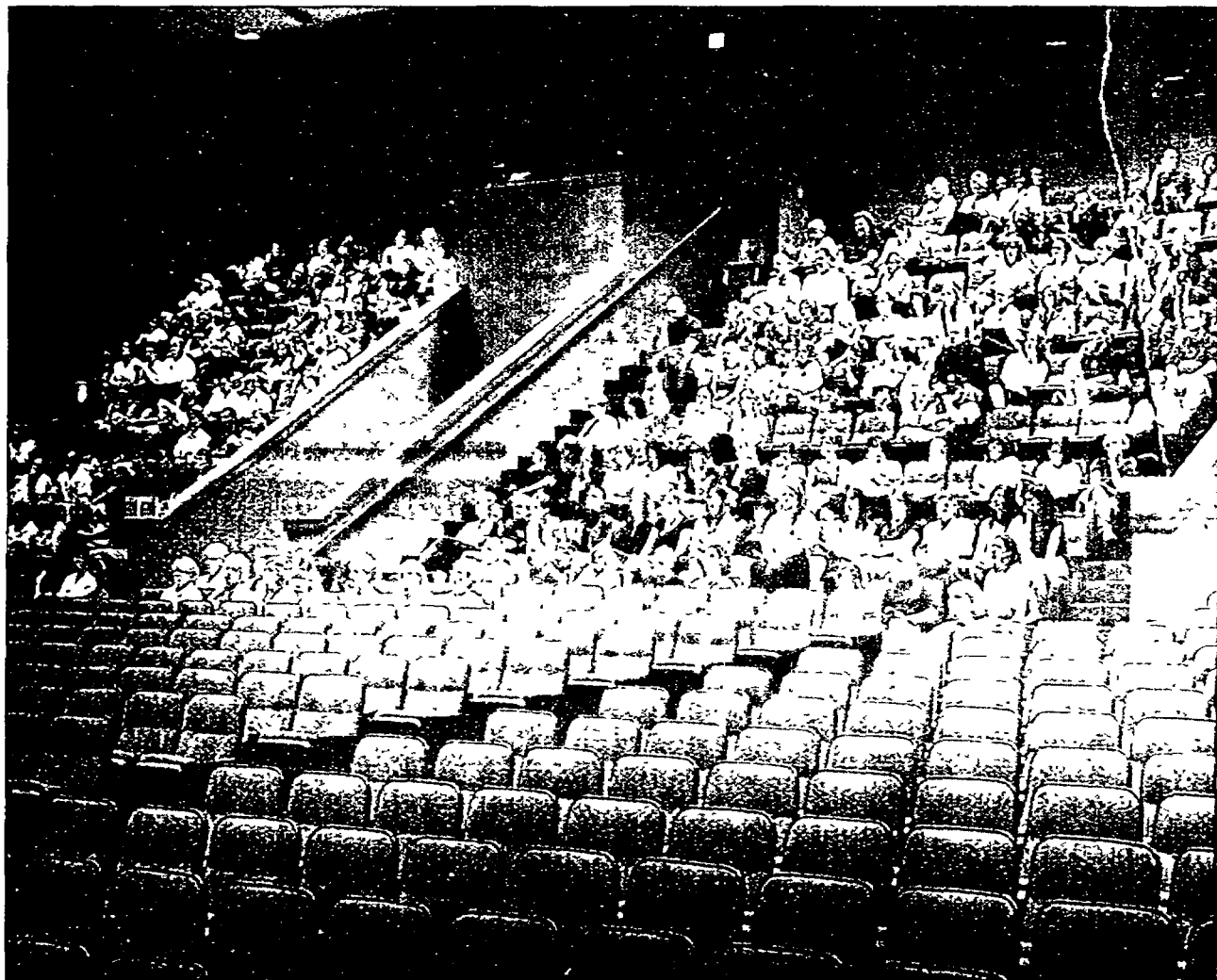

## State mediator called in on teacher contract

### ■ Meeting set for Wed., Sept. 3

With contract negotiations between Northville Public School teachers and the district at a standstill, both sides have agreed to bring in a state mediator.

A meeting scheduled for Wednesday, Sept. 3 with the mediator aims to bring both sides to an agreement. If not, Northville teachers will be working without a contract.

Tom Boomer, chief negotiator for the teachers' bargaining unit this year, believes they've done their part to help save the district money. Last year, Northville teachers took a three-percent pay step freeze.

"That alone saved the district approximately \$1 million," Boomer

### ■ Fundraiser Oct. 10 set to help orphans

When Renu Sandhu visited an orphanage in her native India her brother helped establish, she knew she had to help.

Now the Northville Township resident is spearheading the first annual charity fundraiser "An Evening in Bollywood," to help Indian orphans through the Austin, Texas-based Miracle Foundation.

The event will be from 7:30-10:30 p.m., Friday, Oct. 10, at Rock Financial Showplace in Novi.

It will feature Indian food, a fashion show, music dance performances, and both silent and live auctions. Attire is black tie or Indian dress.

Tickets are \$100 each before Sunday, with tables of 10 costing

\$900. After Sunday, tickets will cost \$125 each, with tables of 10 costing \$1,150. VIP seating, which includes an auction preview are \$1,500 for a table of 10.

#### Orphans receive all funds

All monies are 100 percent tax deductible and will go to the orphans of the Miracle Foundation. "None of the ticket sales or donations will be used for administrative costs," Sandhu said.

The Miracle Foundation is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization dedicated to empowering children to reach their full potential, one orphan at a time. This is accomplished by raising the standard of living for children in orphanages in India, reducing the number of non-orphaned children living in orphanages and increasing the number of domestic adoptions in India.

A group of women known as CARE is the Detroit link for the foundation. CARE is made up of Amit Makhecha of Rangoli Restaurant, Mira Bedi of Chrysalis

Fashions, Rupali Bedi, an event/wedding planner, and Renu (Jasdeep) Sandhu.

CARE is also seeking additional corporate sponsors for the event.

NYX Corporate in Plymouth has agreed to be the title sponsor, and Singh Development is another major sponsor.

Downtown Northville businesses that have provided gift certificates include Geniti's Hole-in-the-Wall, Stamp Peddler, Simply Wine and Urban Blues.

Spree at Eddie Edgar Ice Arena. Poenisch thanked Livonia resident Dianne Marietti, one of the volunteers who was heavily involved in the anti-annexation effort, for helping place signs in Livonia yards and attending every Livonia City Council meeting to pass on the anti-annexation message in her red Stop Annexation T-shirt.

"I really don't like the color red, but all of a sudden I was wearing it every day," Marietti said. "My children are glad it (the primary election) is over," she said. "They called it the 'A' word, and they don't want to hear anything more about it."

Poenisch also thanked former Livonia Mayor Bob Bennett and former councilwoman Maureen Muller Brosnan for coming forward to protest the proposed annexation.

Township residents Fred Shadko of Taxpayers for Responsible Development received many thanks, as did Rhonda Weber, a Stop the Annexation volunteer.

Framed resolutions were presented to Rep. Marc Coriveau (D-Northville) for his role in trying to get legislation passed in Lansing, as well as Poenisch, Shadko, Weber and Marrs, although Marrs was not able to attend the meeting.

Abbo said he felt Livonia voters failed to approve the annexation

because they responded to the plain truth.

"I know that this is probably going to be viewed as one of the most contentious annexation fights in the state of Michigan," he said. "The reason we got caught up in this was because of our culture. We try to help people, and we trusted people when we shouldn't have. Throughout this whole thing, we found out who our friends were and who weren't."

Abbo said when he woke up on the morning of primary election day he wasn't feeling very well.

"But, when the results started coming in about 8:15 that night, you couldn't wipe the smile off of my face," he said.

He said state Sen. Bruce Patterson (R-Canton Township) lost a lot during his efforts to try to get annexation reform legislation passed in the Michigan Senate, such as being removed from some legislative committees.

"I have made it my cause to see that that is reversed," Abbo said.

Coriveau said legislators took a lot of bumps during the effort but that there were also a lot of bridges built, such as the one between him and Abbo.

"I have drafted a letter now to the Senate leadership to get them to pass this legislation, since they now have no reason not to," Coriveau said.

Abbo also spoke of Poenisch's

energy and drive as well as her positive, upbeat attitude throughout the anti-annexation campaign. He saw her as a key component to the campaign's success.

"On the day of the primary election, she told me, 'Mark, we're going to win this!'" he said.

"We will forever be grateful to all of you for your efforts."

A few residents criticized the board for their actions regarding the property, including a man who lives right across the street.

"Here you are with your little celebration, patting yourselves on the back," he said. "We should never have been put in that position. It was wrong. You didn't win. It was the good people of Livonia who saved us."

Another was concerned about looking out over a six-story senior housing complex, which he learned about after reading the agreement.

Township resident Steve Emmsley said he thought the agreement was what the developer wanted in the first place.

"We struggled with this, but our hand was forced," Abbo said. "We're going to try to do the best we can under the circumstances."

### Meeting with REIS

Chip Snider, township manager, said township representatives had

lunch with REIS representatives last week, and that everyone is ready to move forward with the multi-million-dollar Highwood development.

"They apologized for the 'brain damage' that has occurred and wanted assurances from us that they would now be treated fairly and respectfully by township staff," Snider said. "We assured them that they would be."

He added that according to Todd Fink, an attorney present at the lunch, another annexation petition could not be put forth again for at least two years, according to state

law. He also said that the tenants who live on the property have leases that expire in December, at which time they will most likely be removed from the trailers on the property.

Snider reiterated that REIS is ready to start moving on the project.

"They're anxious to hit the ground running, and I believe they're sincere," Snider said. "It's time to move ahead and put this (the annexation attempt) behind us."

sponsored a little boy named Manus through the Christian Children's Fund and wanted to meet him to see if he was receiving her support.

He was exactly as his letters had described and had indeed received the sponsorship money and letters from Monheim.

On May 14, 2000, the director of the CCF, Domador Sahoo, invited the women to his home for dinner. Nothing prepared the women for what they were about to witness. At Sahoo's house were 100 orphans.

Later that evening a little girl named Sheebani came and put her head on Boudreaux's knee. The girl was so tired that Boudreaux picked her up, and the girl literally pushed her body into Boudreaux's arms and fell asleep.

When Boudreaux went upstairs to find the girl's crib, she saw that the child's room had 30 wooden slatted beds with no pillows, mattresses or blankets. Boudreaux knew she had to do something — and soon.

In 2007, she single-handedly raised more than \$1 million for the foundation, which is one of a handful of American organizations allowed to organize domestic adoptions in India, with the agency currently having seven orphanages in its network.

Before establishing the Miracle Foundation, Boudreaux was an

account executive for Fox Television and was in charge of new business development for and advertising firm.

### Visit to Sooch Village

Sandhu, who is married, has a son and a daughter and has lived in Northville for five years, became involved when her brother, Nav Sooch, was the primary donor of the Sooch Village orphanage, which opened in India in March through the Miracle Foundation, and she was invited to the grand opening.

"I had no other purpose but to go and have fun," Sandhu said. "India has a caste system. I watched, and these children, most of which are in the lowest class, were speaking fluent English and going to normal schools. That just got to me. This organization is actually making a difference. I kept thinking, 'I just have to do something.'"

Every year in India, one million children are sent to live in orphanages, Sandhu said.

More than 25 million children currently live in Indian orphanages, and in 2006, there were less than 3,500 domestic and international adoptions in India.

Without support from the outside, these children will grow up uneducated and will likely end up on the streets, forced to commit crimes to survive.

The foundation is also looking

for people to sponsor non-adoptable orphans at a cost at three levels of sponsorship — \$45, \$100 or \$200 a month — with a minimum commitment of five years. Sandhu has adopted a little girl at the Sooch Village named Chikoo, who was born in February.

"You can develop a personal relationship with that child, and the Miracle Foundation will do all the arrangements for you if you want to go visit it," Sandhu said.

"We're breaking the cycle of poverty," she said. "We want to increase awareness."

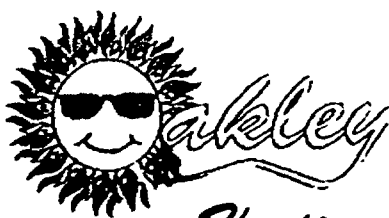

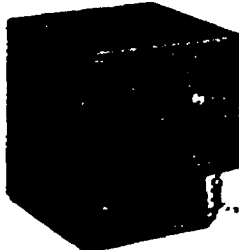

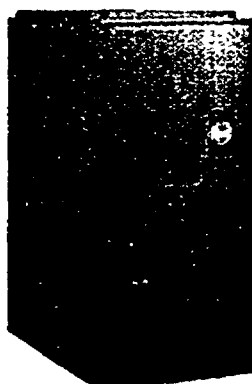

# Northville jockey likes racing at new Pinnacle Race Course

■ He's competed for four decades

Richard Rettele may almost be more at home on the back of a horse than he is in his own skin.

At age 68, the Northville resident has been racing about 40 years and is one of the jockeys racing at the new Pinnacle Race Course in Huron Township.

He and fellow jockey Roy Brooks, from Oklahoma City, are the two oldest quarter-horse riders still racing.

## Born to race

"My father, Joe, was a jockey, and I had four brothers who were all jockeys, too," Rettele said.

His father is deceased, but his brothers are still around, although they've all retired from horse racing.

Rettele's wife, Carol, trains quarter horses, and he trains thoroughbreds.

His daughter, Kim, works at a large quarter-horse facility, JEH Stallion Station, in Pilot Point, Texas.

Rettele was born in Baileyville, Kan., and started his career as a jockey just south of Omaha, Neb. He's also raced in Colorado, Oklahoma and Michigan.

## Track opened July 18

Located about 30 minutes from Northville near the I-275 and Sibley Road exit, the family-oriented Pinnacle track just opened July 18, launching a new era of thoroughbred racing in Michigan.

With the theme, "Horsepower Returns to Motor City," the race course was founded by Jerry Campbell of Jackson.

The inaugural season includes 63 days of racing through Nov. 2, with races beginning at 2:30 p.m. every Tuesday, Friday and Saturday.

Sunday racing, which ended Aug. 24, will be replaced with Monday racing this fall, also beginning at 2:30 p.m. Parking and admission to the track are free, with a minimum bet of \$2 per race.

The \$720,000 Michigan Sires Stakes series will take place Saturday, Oct. 18, which will feature Michigan-bred horses in a variety of divisions.

## Initial phase of facility

The initial phase of construction includes completion of a 1-mile dirt track, a 12,000-square-foot corporate pavilion and 600-1,000 horse stalls. The track is located on 320 acres near Detroit Metro Airport.

J. J. Grace, stall superintendent, said 15 barns with 40 stalls to a barn are currently in use, with another 15 barns to open soon.

"I think it's going to be a good track," Rettele said. "The race track surface is good, and they've done everything they can to get it built quickly."

## Just likes to compete

Rettele said he's won several \$100,000 races.

"I just like the competition," he said. "And we've got some nice horses, so that makes it interesting. That makes a lot of difference."

Rettele, who sports a distinctive RR on his leather chaps, said he's 5-foot 6 and weighs 116-117 pounds.

"I don't have to worry about gaining, but a lot of them (jockeys) have to starve themselves to keep their weight down," he said. "Most of them don't eat on race day."

Jockeys weigh in before every race, including their gear, which is taken into consideration on their weight totals.

"You've got about 3-4 pounds of equipment," Rettele said. He said a couple of extra pounds don't mean much as far as a jockey's race times, but more than that can affect results.

## Also races quarterhorses

Rettele also races quarter horses at a track in Mt. Pleasant. He's at the track seven days a week, sometimes racing in two towns in one day.

"It's fun," he said, and he doesn't have plans to retire yet. "If you keep sound and healthy, that's the most important thing," Rettele said. "A lot of riders get injured."

He's been injured a lot of

times himself but said he's a fast healer.

## Stay fit, work at it

The veteran racer believes the keys to being a good jockey are to stay fit and work at it. "It's like any other sports

event," he said. "The more you practice, the better you get. I would say the riders who don't work at it aren't very successful. In his spare time, he hunts using beagles and coon dogs.

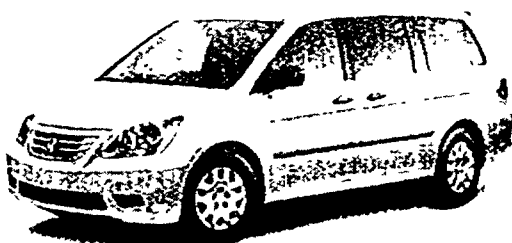

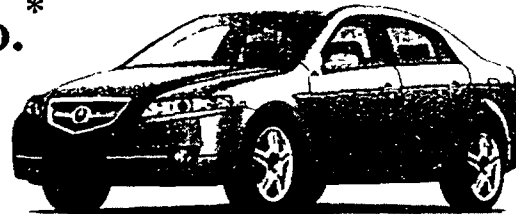

## LEGISLATIVE UPDATE

### Energy bills must provide sensible standards at reasonable costs

The increasing costs of energy and the need to further Michigan's energy independence as well as find alternative energy sources are pressing issues. The Michigan Legislature must work to encourage private enterprise to pursue renewable energy, and we should reward cost-containment efforts. While renewable and alternative energies may not be the cure-all to Michigan's economic woes, nevertheless, Michigan has the highest electric rates of the Midwestern industrial states.

Two bills in the Legislature are attempting to address our energy concerns. House Bill 5524 amends Public Act 141 of 2000. The measure does the following: places a 10 percent cap on electric choice; calls for faster implementation of rate changes; establishes a statutory scheme for de-skewing rates (adjusting the rates that businesses and residents pay to more accurately reflect costs); establishes a certificate of need (CON) program for large expenditures; and imposes a generation surcharge.

In contrast to the House version, the goal of the Senate passed proposal, Senate Bill 213, is to use obtainable levels of renewable energy—such as using solar panels and wind turbines or capturing landfill gases—in a cost-effective manner. The Senate passed proposal provides Michigan residents with an income tax credit of \$2.00 per month to offset any higher electric charges incurred so that citizens do not have to pay for the higher costs of the renewable energy. Energy providers must annually notify customers of the total charges assessed for them to comply and remind residents they are entitled to an offsetting income tax credit.

The integrated standard will allow electric service providers to either produce or purchase a percentage of the electricity they sell to retail customers in Michigan from combined renewable energy, cleaner energy, or through energy efficiency resources such as compact fluorescent light bulbs, smart meters and other devices by the end of 2015. Under SB 213, some of the cost to residents may be refunded through an income tax credit.

HB 5524 and SB 213 are in conference committee. The Senate and House have been negotiating critical aspects of these measures for the past several weeks and will continue to do so. I will vigorously work to ensure that sensible standards for renewable and green energy are passed, at reasonable costs to the taxpayer.

### Senate needs to learn to be a good neighbor

Many have undoubtedly heard the phrase, "good fences make good neighbors." I prefer "good people make good neighbors." Three weeks ago our neighbors in Livonia epitomized my preferred quotation when they voted in support of Northville Township by opposing the annexation of the Highwood property.

Because they made their voices heard, new development and new jobs will come to life where today only empty buildings stand. I have great hope the property can be developed in a way that will bring prosperity and new opportunity to Northville Township and its neighbors in a way that is sensitive to the development's impact on our local residents and resources.

I must also take this opportunity to reiterate the importance of passing common-sense annexation reform. I know the Senate can be a good neighbor to urban townships if my bill is allowed a vote. That is why I am calling on the Senate to stop holding up my bill and vote to reform the annexation statute to prevent another annexation from putting two neighboring communities against one another.

While working to reform annexation I learned that we can accomplish more by working together. This applies as much to our state as we work to diversify our economy, reform government and create jobs as it does for local communities working to secure responsible development. I will do my part and continue to ask my colleagues in the House and Senate to set aside partisan differences and work together to create good policy that will help our state move forward, just as I have done with respect to annexation reform.

### Cross-walk confusion

While well intentioned and undeniably convenient, the pedestrian cross-walk at the Northville city clock needs to be reevaluated. In my opinion, the cross-walk was not well thought out and in its current state is dangerous to pedestrians by giving them a false sense of security and encouraging them to cross with impunity. What is not clear to me is exactly where the crossing is located or how many cross-walks there are.

Is the pedestrian crossing located between the two signs located east and west of the clock? The signage seems to imply this. While I didn't measure the distance between the signs, it appears to be a 40- to 50-foot wide cross-walk; certainly not a typical pedestrian crossing for a city like Northville. Or are there are two smaller crossings, each one east or west of the clock? There are concerns with either condition that I will explain. Part of my confusion stems from the absence of crossing lines on the roadway as required by the definition of "cross-walk" in the Michigan Vehicle Code. Most of

the pedestrian crossings I have seen are clearly designated with white parallel and broad perpendicular lines on the roadway. The slight change in the shading of the paving bricks is, in my opinion, insufficient contrast for a motorist or even a pedestrian to identify exactly what is or is not the cross-walk.

Secondly, just to keep from hitting the sign, curb, or even the clock, I'm sure we all remember there are a lot of things the motorist must do precisely at the "clock crossing point." The roadway is narrow, now made even narrower with the crossing signs, and there are turns in the road required to navigate around the clock. Additionally, once inside the cross-walk, the clock, its island and the high flower bed obstruct the motorist's view to the left. While the clock, island and flowers are definitely aesthetically pleasing, they prevent a motorist from clearly seeing pedestrians entering the cross-walk from the left and across the street.

Additionally, if there is only one cross-walk, by law the motorist must stop before the first sign to yield to pedestrians crossing on the far side of the clock. A driver in the cross-walk while there are pedestrians in it is in violation. That's a long way, and a lot of obstructions in between, for a motorist to see diagonally across the road to the far side of the clock. Depending on where one is, I would say it is sometimes impossible to clearly see a pedestrian on the far side. Now add to this pedestrians crossing the road as if they are clearly visible and there is no oncoming traffic flow and you have a recipe for a disaster.

The third, and probably the most dangerous condition exists when a vehicle is proceeding west on Main Street and approaching the crossing point west of the clock. At the clock, on the north side is a loading zone in the middle of the cross-walk, or just before the west crosswalk if you assume are there two cross-walks. So now, when a vehicle is in the loading zone, in addition to the previously mentioned obstructions on the left produced by the clock, island and raised flower bed, the motorist may have an obstructed view of pedestrians coming from the right - and all the while trying to avoid the generally larger vehicle parked in the loading zone, the signs and curbs and other distractions common to the clock area. When I was growing up, I was taught never to cross the street from an area between parked cars, or while obstructed or shadowed by any parked car. Unfortunately, this is exactly what the existing clock cross-walk is encouraging pedestrians to do.

This crossing needs to be reviewed by a knowledgeable pedestrian safety specialist and consideration given first to safety and traffic flow, with aesthetics reserved. Otherwise, I believe jaywalking is safer for the pedestrian. At least most jaywalkers look both ways when crossing Main Street. The current cross-walk enables pedestrians not to.

### Vote against embryonic stem cell research

Unfortunately, there is a small margin between the November election and my 18th birthday that will prevent me from voting. The most important issue, to me, beyond the presidential election, is the referendum to lift the restrictions on embryonic stem cell research. I wish I could have a hand in voting it down. Since I can't, I urge other Michiganders to vote against this referendum for the following reasons:

Embryonic stem cell research is already allowed in Michigan, but it can only be funded by private enterprise. This referendum will not lift restrictions on the research itself, but allow the government to use your tax dollars to fund it.

Contrary to media hype, embryonic stem cells show little hope. Many of the patients who have received experimental treatments have died as a direct result. On the other hand, adult stem cell research, which has received less funding and far less media attention, is currently being used to successfully treat 72 separate diseases.

The use of embryonic stem cells is morally questionable. Because an embryo is the first stage of life, its destruction is directly linked with the abortion debate. Adult stem cells carry no such moral implications.

Researchers are studying embryos in Michigan right now, and will continue to do so after the November election. The question is, the way Michigan's economy is right now, is it right for the government to take your hard-earned money and spend it on research that is morally questionable and that has thus far shown itself to be ineffective, if not dangerous?

1. Ultimately, they have to work with whoever prevails, which I am fully committed to do.

2. There is the personal risk of political repercussions when it is the endorsing judge's time to run for re-election.

3. Personally, I have always been reluctant to endorse because I find it a bit arrogant to think that my endorsement or that of anyone else carries any great weight.

Judges are elected officials and employees of the state, not the court. Chief Judge Lowe anticipated the challenges and pressures that this judicial election would pose to our court employees and instituted a policy for the court employees which was designed to keep the court out of the election as much as possible, while safeguarding each employee's free speech right. Two of our three judges (the judges who will work with the successful candidate) voluntarily abided by this policy during the recent primary, which was a hard fought campaign by a qualified field of candidates. One judge opted to exercise his right to endorse a candidate which resulted in an uneven playing field. It created the false perception that the other two judges either endorsed the same candidate, or that they had no opinion on the race. For this reason, I am taking a stand to support Joe Barone, who I believe is the best candidate.

As a result, your arch doesn't collapse adequately inward to absorb shock after your heel strikes the ground and transfers weight to the ball of your foot. This is called "supination," or underpronation, which can result in too much shock traveling up the legs. Runners and exercise walkers whose feet supinate are prone to foot, ankle, knee, and leg injuries. To avoid problems, they should select running/walking shoes with as much midsole cushioning as possible and avoid footwear with stability control devices, as they restrict supinators' needed inward foot motion. ## ARE YOU PARTIAL TO DENTURES

Some patients with missing teeth have neither enough remaining (or properly positioned) teeth for a bridge nor sufficient bone for implants. 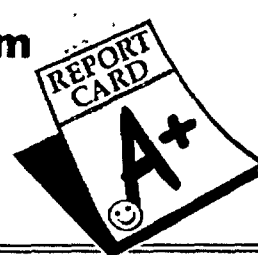

## Love and Logic teaches positive parenting

From the terrible 2s to the tire-some 20s, parenting has its hurdles.

Henry Ford Health System's Greg Oliver is offering help through the "Becoming a Love and Logic Parent" program.

Oliver, a psychologist and the program's director, brought the positive-parenting course to southeastern Michigan last year after he and Drs. Victor Gardner and Wiley Rosbury received training in Colorado for the national program.

"(We teach parents about) giving a problem back to the kid; not jump in, lecture and punish," Oliver said. "Get the kid to think how they're going to handle this, sharing control."

The eight-hour course is split

between four two-hour Tuesday evening sessions at Henry Ford Health locations in Novi, Dearborn, Troy and Sterling Heights. The four Novi sessions begin Sept. 9 at Henry Ford Health's Columbus Center campus on 12 Mile Road, west of Haggerty Road.

"Most of the common problems are defiance, disrespect, backtalk and attitude. It's usually about homework and chores," Oliver said. "What we avoid is the traditional punishment where the parent becomes a strict enforcer."

"The kids are still held accountable, but the parents aren't seen as the bad guy. The kids learn from the problem and direct anger at (the problem) instead of the parent. The big 'not to do' is showing anger, adding drama to the situation."



Oliver said the courses usually have between 10-15 parents each.

He said a typical session alternates between lecture, questions,

group discussions and viewing film created specifically for the course. As part of the \$75-per-parent registration fee, parents also receive a workbook complementing the four-week course.

"It's a pretty even mix. Some parents come in that are still pregnant and want to get ready ahead of time. Middle school years are the most common," Oliver said. "We get a lot of good, positive feedback from the parents about how it's working at home."

He currently teaches the courses in Troy and Sterling Heights, while Gardner teaches in Novi and Rosbury in Dearborn.

With ongoing registration until the courses are filled, Oliver expects the program to continue growing. He said the program is sending three more psychologists to Colorado this year so more classes can be offered by the end

of the year.

The Dearborn location will also debut a new course, "Effective Parenting of Toddlers and Preschoolers," Sept. 2 for parents of the younger age groups. The Dearborn location will also offer the "Becoming a Love and Logic Parent" course Oct. 21.

## Northville's Class of 2007 posts 97.49 percent graduation rate

### Under new state formula

Northville Public Schools posted a graduation rate of 97.49 percent for Northville High School and a district graduation rate of 92.66 percent for the Class of 2007, according to a Michigan Department of Education report. The district graduation rate also factors in students who completed their education in 2007 as part of the special education center program at Cooke School, which is operated by Northville Public Schools.

The release of graduation rates for the class of 2007 marks the first time that Michigan has used

a "four-year cohort" graduation rate. In order to comply with the federal No Child Left Behind (NCLB) Act of 2001, Michigan is moving to an accountability system in which a school's graduation rate includes only "on-time" graduates who earn regular diplomas within four years of entering high school.

"We are proud that such a high percentage of our students graduate each year," said Northville Superintendent Dr. Leonard R. Reznierski. "It is our ultimate goal as educators to ensure that our students have the knowledge and skills they will need to be successful in college and the workplace."

The class of 2007 graduation rates for high schools and districts were calculated by tracking

individual students who enrolled in ninth grade for the 2003-04 school year, and graduated in 2007 with a regular diploma.

Continuing students, who were not reported as diploma recipients, were recorded for accountability purposes under the new standards as "off-track."

As a result, seniors who sought additional credits during summer school (after completing their senior year) were not considered "on-time" graduates. The only students exempt from the "four-year cohort" are those enrolled in home school or private school, those who move out of state before graduation, or those who are deceased.

This new graduation rate calculation also meets the guidelines provided by the National

Governor's Association (NGA). The formula has been adopted by all 50 states and is slated to be in place in at least 39 states by 2010. As more and more states implement the NGA standard, state-to-state comparisons of high school graduation rates will become more meaningful.

The use of the new formula will mean decreases in the graduation rates for most schools in Michigan. It also may mean that some schools will not meet the current NCLB target graduation rate of 80 percent. In the past, districts were allowed to count every student who earned a diploma, no matter how long it took them to finish.

There are a number of reasons why students may need more time to graduate. Some may ben-

efit from a slower learning pace in order to master content and skills. Others may be recovering from an academic setback or poor life choice. And, others may be behind in courses or credits due to a long-term illness or frequent family moves.

It also is important to note that under the new formula those students not included in a school's or district's graduation rate cannot be assumed to be dropouts. Under the new graduation rate calculations, on-time graduates,

those who need more time, and those who transfer out of state must first be counted before determining how many students have dropped out.

"Still, even one dropout is one too many," Dr. Reznierski said. "As part of our ongoing school improvement efforts, we continue to develop interventions and support systems that ensure all our students maximize their potential for success in learning with the goal of earning their high school diploma."

## BACK TO SCHOOL: State mediator called in for negotiations

said, "not to mention substantial savings down the road because future pay increases to the teachers will always be behind one year."

Boomer stated they are looking for a fair and equitable contract. "That's what it comes down to for all of our teachers."

And because no contract has been ratified, the district is allowed to impose a three-month school calendar, running through Thanksgiving.

"The calendar they imposed is not one the teacher's bargaining unit supports," Boomer said. "We'd like a full calendar; it's part of a full contract."

### Dates to remember

The Board of Education voted at the Aug. 19 meeting to set district-wide school calendar dates through Nov. 28 as negotiations continue between the school district and the Northville Education Association.

Teachers Report/Professional Day took place yesterday, with Teacher Work Day slated today. More calendar dates set by the board are:

• Aug. 29 and Sept. 1 — Labor Day Recess

• Sept. 2 — Friday Day for Students

• Sept. 22 — Professional Development Day (No school for students.)

• Nov. 4 — Professional Development Day (No school for students.)

• Nov. 27 and 28 — Thanksgiving Recess

The board also selected the fall Parent/Teacher Conference dates for the district's six elementary schools, two middle schools and one high school. Elementary school conferences will take place Nov. 13 and 14, with students having a half day of school in the morning on both days and the conferences scheduled in the afternoon and early evening. Middle school conferences will be Oct. 7 and 9, with the high school conferences planned Oct. 14 and 16.

The Michigan Employment Relations Commission, the state agency that resolves labor disputes involving public and private sector employees, has ruled that districts have the right to implement a calendar before the start of school in cases where a contract settlement has not been reached.

The Wayne Regional Educational Service Agency Board of Education has also established dates for Wayne County districts, as required by Public Act 101, for the five-year period from 2008-09 through the 2012-13 school year. Winter break will be Dec. 20, 2008-Jan. 4, 2009, returning Jan. 5. Spring break will be April 10-19, 2009, returning April 20.

### Savings suggestions

Boomer, a fourth grade teacher with six years service in Northville, said they'd feel good getting a timely contract and not have to worry about contract negotiations while school is underway.

Additional suggestions the teachers' bargaining unit offered is a calendar year that would provide for a one-week February break.

The state says a district only has to close for Presidents Day in February.

Boomer says most districts close down for an entire week, and Northville teachers have offered to do that.

"The reason we offered is because of the savings to our district. It cuts down on all the operational costs covering energy, bus service and food service," he said.

A public survey done throughout the district on the subject of a February break showed families of Northville would be happy with a weeklong winter break, according to Boomer.

Another cost-cutting measure teachers offered is Early Retirement Incentive (ERI).

Those at the top end of the pay scale would be offered a buyout that, according to Boomer, allows the district to hire a new teacher in at less money, if the position needs replacing.

Boomer closed out his list of money-saving measures mentioning a hot topic.

Northville does not allow children of their teachers and other district employees to attend school in the district.

"Livonia and Farmington have open enrollment, and Novi has just started. If, for instance, 100 additional children of employees were enrolled in the district, they would receive a large amount of money. Right now, per pupil the dollar amount is \$8,543," Boomer said.

If the district is looking for more money, he added, open enrollment should be something to consider.

"Northville has a great education system," he said. "Some teachers may want the option of having their children attend Northville schools."

### Negotiations ongoing

Northville Public schools officials and members of the teachers' union have met 10 times since negotiations began in March in an effort to reach a new collective bargaining agreement.

"We remain encouraged as negotiations with the Northville Education Association continue and are confident both parties will be able to reach a fair and equitable agreement," Wadsworth said.

Rezmierski said he's optimistic and genuinely hopeful that the district can reach a contract settlement with teachers and move on. "We're trying to be fair and equitable to everyone," he said. "The economy has caused a challenge across the board."

However, he's pleased where the district stands as far as the number of students attending Northville schools.

"Change is inevitable, but we're seeing more children coming to our

schools," he said. "There's definitely a positive uptick in enrollment."

### Summer's almost over; learning about to begin

It's time to store the beach balls and sandals and get out the backpacks and spiral notebooks.

With the Labor Day Weekend upon us, and school starting Tuesday in Northville, teachers like Angela Watts are preparing their classrooms for the 2008-09 school year.

"I can't believe summer's already over, but I'm very excited to start the school year," said Watts, who teaches elective classes at Hillside Middle School.

Classes she teaches include physical education, keyboarding, study skills and performing arts. This will be her second year teaching at Hillside. Before that, she was the building substitute teacher at Hillside.

"I fell in love with this school," Watts said, recalling that her substitute teaching days were a great learning experience.

This week, she is preparing lesson plans for the upcoming semester, cleaning and preparing the classroom and getting materials ready for her students.

"Students had a transition day on Monday, visiting the school and getting familiar with classrooms," Watts said. "They were able to come in with their parents, get their class schedule and find the various rooms." Fifth-graders had a chance to come to the school before the close of school last spring, but this was the first time they were able to come with their parents and see their class schedule.

"I'm really excited for the students to come back," Watts said. A resident of Plymouth, she graduated from Eastern Michigan

University in 2006 and is working on finishing her master's degree in special education at the University of Michigan Dearborn.

"When I grew up, I loved babysitting, so teaching young children became one of my passions," she said. "I've also taught dance for eight years and love working with children. I really want to make a difference in my student's lives and have a positive effect on their education."

### Beyond MEAP, ACT scores

Leonard Rezmierski, Ph.D., superintendent of Northville Public Schools, said he can hardly believe summer's almost over.

"I can still remember shaking hands at graduation and handing out candy at the July 4th parade," he said, adding that a series of events is slated in each building this week in preparation for the new school year.

"We use this week as a time for teachers to interact with their colleagues and get up to date on any legal changes regarding state or federal regulations, including such issues as homeland security," Rezmierski said.

"We also use this week to discuss impacts on the curriculum," he said. Rezmierski said the vast majority of teachers have already been in and out of their respective school buildings for a while preparing for the school year.

Rezmierski said data is currently on file for the MEAP (Michigan Education Assessment Program) and ACT (American College Testing) scores for Northville students, and the district is still reviewing them.

"We use these results to see if we are right on the beam or off the

mark," he said. "If we are not on the mark, we adapt our curriculum to meet the needs of the students. We're always tweaking our curriculum."

The district also looks at such data as how girls did versus boys. "You have to go 'inside' the scores," Rezmierski said. Year-to-year comparisons are also done with the various grades.

"These scores are a treasure trove of information," he said.

### First day sets the tone

So, like it or not, summer's almost over, and next week the learning begins.

"We're delighted to welcome back our students and their families," Wadsworth said. "Our custodial and maintenance staff have done a wonderful job making sure the buildings are in fine shape, our busses and drivers are ready, and lunches will be served. And, the principals and teachers are looking forward to a great school year."

Rezmierski said next Tuesday, the first day of school, is one of the most important days of the school year.

"Each building has announcements and plans about how to welcome back students," Rezmierski said. "The whole system is started up, and this day sets the tone for the whole school year. It's a day of celebration. We're getting together and looking forward to the journey of the 2008-09 school year."

He sees the first day of school as a day of reconnecting.

"We're getting on with an important part of life in our society," Rezmierski said.

170-24.2 - Definitions

- Canopy/Street Tree - A deciduous tree which has a height of 25 feet or more and a trunk with at least five (5) feet of clear stem at maturity.

170-24.10 - Street trees, medians, cul-de-sacs and driveway entrances.

- Street trees shall be provided within all public rights-of-ways and private road easements at a rate of one (1) tree per 40 linear feet of road frontage, rounded upward to the next whole number.
- Medians and boulevard entrances shall be planted with one (1) canopy tree, or two (2) ornamental trees per 30 feet of length, rounded upward to the next whole number.
- Public rights-of-way shall be planted with sod or other suitable live ground cover, and shall be maintained by the owner or occupant of the adjacent property.

# Sisters leave Northville to study in Japan

Meryl and Leah Waldo do everything together, and now they're embarking on their greatest adventure to date — a year of study in Japan. The Northville sisters left Aug. 23 for Kansai Gaidai University in Hirakata, located just outside Osaka, Japan's second largest city.

The girls became intrigued with the idea of studying abroad while tutoring English to Asian students at the University of Michigan.

At Kansai Gaidai, they'll study written and spoken Japanese, as well as take electives in Japanese brushwork and pottery.

Meryl, 19, hopes to pursue a career in design, while Leah, 20, plans to work in the hospitality industry.

"A lot of Japanese people are moving into the area, especially in Novi," Leah said. "As I want to be a personal chef, or work in hotel management, that will help me cater to their needs."

Being homeschooled by their parents, Carol and Martin, helped them complete the rigorous requirements to study abroad, they said.

The process began with separate applications to Eastern Michigan University, EMU's Asian Studies Program, and Kansai Gaidai. After being accepted to all three, they began

their quest to raise \$22,000 each. Scholarships from the Benjamin A. Gilman International Scholarship Program and the Association of Teachers of Japanese, along with a private donation, will cover their tuition as well as living and travel expenses.

"Being homeschooled taught us how to manage our time well as well as be diligent achieving our goals," Leah said.

"We learned to be more independent," Meryl said. "No one's going to tell you what to do when you reach a certain age. You have to make things happen

for yourself."

The Waldos will live in a dorm and have been e-mailing the Japanese "study buddies" they've been set up with to ease the transition. They hope to find jobs, attend a traditional tea ceremony, and take side trips to Tokyo and other destinations.

On the way back to Northville, they hope to stop in Thailand, India, Jerusalem and Europe using "Around the World" plane tickets.

Carol Waldo said she is excited about the opportunities her daughters will share.

"We're thankful that they can do it together. That's huge. If we were sending one daughter over there it would be different," she said. "We're hopeful that they will have Christian influence there and that they will help

other students with their English."

Since Meryl and Leah won't be able to visit their parents and six brothers during the school year, Carol said she'll try to raise some money to make a trip to Japan.

"We've had a lot of lemonade stands there at the corner, and I'll be out there having a few more," Carol said. "Stop by and grab a glass."

# COUNTRY DAY CHAMPS AGAIN

Makes: 4 servings

- 1 pound beef skirt steak
- 1 jar (16 ounces) Pace Salsa Verde
- 8 cups chopped romaine lettuce
- 1/4 cup shredded Mexican cheese blend
- 1/4 cup sliced pitted ripe olives (optional)
- 1/4 cup sour cream (optional)

3. Slice steak diagonally into thin slices. Divide lettuce among 4 bowls. Top each with 1/4 of the steak, 2 tablespoons salsa and 1 tablespoon cheese. Top each with 1 tablespoon olives and 1 tablespoon sour cream, if desired.

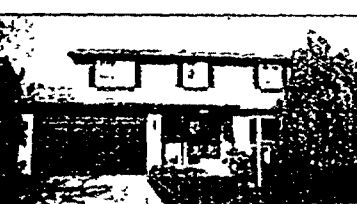

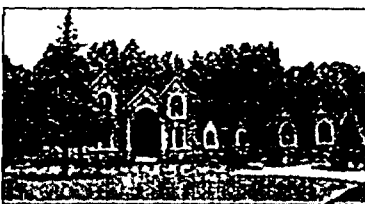
