Herrmann big winner in township race

In one of the biggest voter turnouts in U.S. history, people flocked to the polls Nov. 4 to elect Democrat Barack Obama as the 44th

president of the United States. With balmy weather and near record-breaking temperatures in the 60s in Southeast Michigan, voters could be seen walking to the polls in shirt sleeves even through the evening hours.

Locally, there was 80 percent voter turnout in Northville Township's 18 precincts (16,742 ballots cast out of 20,756 registered voters. In the City of Northville's Precinct 1 (Wayne County), the number was slightly lower at 77 percent (1,768 out of 2,288) but in Precinct 2 (Oakland County) it was 80 percent (2,160 out of 2,694).

Northville Township had five candidates running for four Board of Trustees seats, but it was newcomer Mindy Herrmann finishing as the big winner and receiving the most votes with 9,032.

Three incumbents earned back their spots on the board. Marjorie Banner received the second most votes with 8,615. Marv Gans was next with 8,485 votes, followed by Chris Roosen with

Carol Poenisch, the lone Democrat in the race, received 7,515 votes, and there were 215 write-in votes.

"I am thrilled to have successfully communicated my message of ethical leadership, fiscal accountability and strategic vision for Northville Township. I am proud that the voters see in me a true leader, and I'm honored to work on our citizens' behalf," Herrmann said. "Because of my training as a career Marine Corps officer, the people of Northville Township know they are getting a proven fighter, someone they can depend on to skillfully fight for their interests. Ultimately, I feel tremendously grateful for this opportunity to serve our wonderful community."

Bongiovanni: Family of patriots

Members are devoted to U.S. military service

When it comes to serving their country, the local Bongiovanni family has definitely made its mark.

Come Veterans Day on Tuesday, they ly the U.S. flag and stand proud as former members of the military themselves as well as honor relatives - both past and present - whose mission was or is to uphold our freedoms.

The three remaining Bongiovanni brothers, Frank, Joseph and Eugene, all of Northville, served as grand marshals at this year's Memorial Day parade, getting to ride in a 1973 Mustang convertible. Frank and Joseph served in the military for two years, and Eugene served

Frank and Mary Bongiovanni moved to the city in 1923 with their four oldest children. After settling in, they had six more for a total of five sons and five

The four oldest sons served in World War II, and the youngest son served in the Korean War. Mary, a Blue Star Mother, joined the Northville Veterans of Foreign Wars Post 4012 Ladies Auxiliary in 1949 and was followed by her five daughters and several granddaughters, who are also members of the local post.

"She always flew the flag, and she had this little plaque in the window with five stars for her five sons who were in the service," Eugene said.

The late Sam Bongiovanni, the first in the family to serve his country in

1940, who died in 1967, served in the U.S. Army in World War II, entering the service at the beginning of the war. He spent five years in the Army without

a single furlough, traversing the Philippine jungles and suffering from malaria after returning home.

"He had the best war stories,"

Joe said. The late Tony Bongiovanni, who died in 2004 and is buried in Rural Hill Cemetery, served in the U.S. Navy in World War II and as a Seabee, landing the Pacific soon after the U.S. Marines. His son, Tom, served with the U.S. Army in the Vietnam War.

Frank Bongiovanni served in the U.S. Air Force in World War II and was a B-17 ball gunner. His son, Dan, served in the Marine Corps in Vietnam, and his grandson, Ryan, served in the U.S. Army and is currently with

the Army National Guard. Another of his grandsons, 'Honor the dead by helping the living. Joe Bongiovanni

Robbie, served in the U.S. Army in Iraq.

Joseph Bongiovanni served in the U.S. Navy during World War II, was on an amphibious troop transport and was one of the soldiers who participated in the invasion on Okinawa. His son, Joe, served in the U.S. Army during the Vietnam War, and his grandson, Brett, just returned from active duty in Iraq.

Northville teacher contract ratified

Union, board reach three-year agreement


The Northville Public Schools Board of Education announced that the tentative three-year agreement reached between the negotiating teams for the Northville Public Schools and the Northville Education Association on Oct. 13 has been ratified by both parties.

Members of the Northville Education Association (NEA), which represents Northville's teachers, voted to ratify the agreement on Oct. 29. The agreement was subsequently ratified by the Northville Public Schools Board of Education at a Special Call Board of Education meeting on Oct. 30.

The agreement calls for a three-year contract which covers the 2008-09 and 2009-10 and 2010-11 school years and maintains 180 days of student instruction in each year. Included in the agreement is a 1-percent salary increase each year. In addition, teachers on the step schedule will receive their step raise for each of the three years. A modified salary schedule for teachers hired after 11/1/08 is also a part of the tentative agreement. The modified salary schedule calls for the same minimum and maximum salaries as the existing wage scale, with even percentage increments between steps, a schedule which will produce cost savings in the long-term.

Under the terms of the contract, the 500+ members of the Education Association will continue to have the option to receive health care coverage under Community Blue PPO 1 or Health Alliance Plan (HAP). However, their contribution toward health care premium costs will increase from one-quarter of one percent of salary to one-half of one percent of their annual salary.







Northville Beautification Commission members 'go green'

■ Support bottle deposit law expansion

Jim Morche said Northville Township Beautification Commission members are encouraging residents going green" these days.

In other words, they're interested not only in keeping America beautiful but also in making it a better place in which

The Northville Township Beautification Commission has stepped outside its usual role and has called upon residents and the rest of the township governmental units to 'go green' as a means of improving the environment," said Commission

Member Morche. The commission supports the expansion of the state's bottle deposit law to include juice, water and sports drink contain-

According to Morche, two measures are currently being considered in the expansion of the recycling program in Michigan.

"One is an expansion of the bottle/can deposits law," he said. "This legislation can be expanded only if three-quarters of the state lawmakers concur."

The other measure, HB 5612, is a penny tax on all sales above \$2, with the proceeds being placed in a recycling fund.

The bottle deposit concept was pioneered in Oregon in 1971. The state's deposit on bottles and cans program was passed in 1976.

Surprisingly, Michigan is one of only 11 states with bottle deposit laws. (Other states with deposit laws are California, Connecticut, Delaware, Hawaii, Iowa, Maine, Massachusetts, New York, Oregon and Vermont.) These states recycle more waste than all the other states combined. Each of the "recycling states" has reduced overall litter between 30 and 64 percent. It is estimated that

states with container deposit laws recycle 78 percent of their containers, while states without such legislation recycle only 23 percent.

Commission Chair Marie Barr said Michigan roadways are much cleaner than many states, with fewer bottles and cans on the made.

Another "green" step supported by the commission is more recycling of materials:

Commissioner Sue Hillebrand said despite population growth, recycling in the community has declined

The commission is also trying to increase awareness of and utilization of hazardous waste

recycling. Toxic materials such as batteries, oil-based paint, solvents, aerosol containers, household chemicals, computer equipment, corrosive acids, fluorescent light bulbs, insecticides, herbicides, kerosene, mercury items, medical waste, propane tanks, transmission fluid and antifreeze should not be included with recyclables. They should be taken to hazardous waste sites for proper disposal. The commission also encourages residents to recycle correctly.

"Separating newspapers, glass and plastic saves recycling crews time placing these items in the appropriate compartments on the truck," Morche said. He added that broken glass contain-

ers in recycling bins pose a safety hazard to workers separating materials.

The commission also supports the use of reusable tote bags while shopping. "This is the third alternative to the question at the supermarket of 'Paper or plastic?" Morche said. Most supermarkets sell such tote bags available for a nominal fee. These are designed to replace the paper or

plastic ones that eventually end up in landfills.

Other members of the Northville Township Beautification Commission include Catherine Sellas, Larry Aepelbacher, Marjorie Faessler, Audrey Mistor-Jackman, Diane Jefferson, Dorothy Mack, Patricia Page and Barbara O'Brien, the group's founder and a member for the past 25 years.

slated for downtown

■ Work won't begin until 2010

It's been more than a year since Northville's beautiful Town Square was dedicated on Oct. 20, 2007.

It's now time to start working on improvements to the aging infrastructure of downtown.

Downtown Development Authority staff will begin preconstruction meetings in the next few months on the Downtown Sidewalk & Landscape Replacement

In 2005, city officials hired Beckett and Raeder, Inc., to develop a strategic plan for downtown Northville. The plan was completed in June and adopted by city council members in July 2006.

The plan recommended five subcommittees be established - Design, Business Mix, Marketing, Organization and Parking, which was done.

The goal of the Design Committee is to implement the physical improvements downtown, including the streetscape

Current improvements date back to the Main Street '78 project, the Downtown Development Authority's first significant such project.

"Many of the sidewalks are cracked and patched, the trees have suffered in the harsh, urban conditions, and the lighting source is outdated and inefficient when compared to the energy-saving technologies available today," said Lori Ward, DDA director, in a Nov. 3 letter to Mayor Chris Johnson and city council.

DESIGN SERVICES NEEDED

To address the conditions of the sidewalks, trees and lighting, the DDA staff needs to seek out professional design services to prepare a Conceptual Design Plan for the improvements.

The plan will address the

repair and replacement of all deteriorating conditions downtown, make sure the work meet s all current code and safety ordinances and standards and that it will have minimal maintenance.

Other goals are to create a unique visual experience while ensuring compatibility with the Town Square, address parking lot screening and design, improve public open space, and connect downtown to Ford Field and Mill Race Village.

Additional aspects are to address the appearance as well as pedestrian and vehicular circulation of Mary Alexander Court, improve overall pedestrian connections downtown, explore ways to add outdoor cafes and seating, and balance parking needs with other streetscape objectives.

The DDA Staff will use cost estimates developed through the conceptual design process to apply for grant funding for the project through such agencies as the MDOT.

The conceptual plan is slated to be completed in June 2009 to allow enough time to develop bid documents and specifications for winter bidding.

The DDA has approved \$45,000 for conceptual design fees. City council members approved the issuance of a Request for Proposals (RFP) from area design consultants at their Monday meeting.

The project area encompasses the four prime blocks of downtown Northville, bounded by Wing Street to the West, Hutton Street to the east, Dunlap Street to the north and Cady Street to the south.

This is not going to be a fancy, bells-and-whistles project," Ward said. "And there will be public input," through workshops, planning commis-sion and Northyille Historic District Commission.

More improvements Board approves DDA Web site redesign

As the saying goes, "There's no such thing as the status quo ... if you're not mov-

ing forward, you're moving backwards." With this phrase in mind, the Northville Downtown Development Authority staff received approval Sept. 16 from DDA Board members to make important upgrades to the authority's Web site, https://downtownnorthville.org.

At last month's meeting, the board approved a bid of \$1,875 from AccuNet Web Services of Milford for the upgrade, which will include the development of new graphics and a transfer of all of the DDA's existing Web site content.

Ongoing annual costs will include \$45 a month for hosting, e-mail and customer support, as well as an online directory of businesses. DDA staff members Lori Ward, director, and Cindy Abar will now also take primary responsibility for updating information on the site.

Currently, Abar can only access the list

of businesses.

"It will be nice to have direct access to the site," Abar said.

The DDA will also contract with AccuNet to provide an e-mail list service for \$10 a month. This will bring the annual fee for maintenance and services

The site's graphics will be done by New Moon Visions, a graphics and advertising firm in Plymouth. IMJ Communications in Royal Oak will also be involved in the site's redesign.

The Web site's new look will feature the light blue, green and yellow color scheme from the "timeless ... with a twist" logo recently created by New Moon Visions. "Information should be easier to find

and include such items as a parking map of the downtown area," Ward said. Questions and surveys will also be able to be answered online. The Web site update should be completed soon, accord-

ing to Ward. New Moon developed a revised look and format for the Web site as part of the DDA

Marketing Plan. Technology has changed since the DDA developed the site in 2001, and the format of the site is outdated as it does not use the entire screen. New Moon staff also think the site needs to incorporate the new logo developed for the downtown, graphics, colors and typeface to send a consistent message to the public.

Finally, the site needs to be revamped to serve as a better tool for business recruitment and retention. The goal for the upgrade is to have the new Web site serve as a one-stop-shopping site for informa-tion about downtown Northville.


The initial contract with Municipal Web

Services to develop the site in 2001 was \$11,900, with another \$4,410 spent in the first year for hosting, maintenance and marketing of the site.

Since then, annual maintenance of the site has averaged \$4,500 a year. So, this new proposal will save the authority a considerable amount each year.

... Each training phase includes 'extensive hours of ground events, flight simulator, day and night flying, and flight related instruction. Additional instruction is received on flight formation, navigation, low-level navigation flying, visual and instrument transition, radar cell formation, and simulated refueling and airdrop missions.

After primary training, students move on to advanced training in one of several tracks. bomber assignments fly the T-38A aircraft; airlift-tanker students fly the T-1A aircraft; multiengine turboprop students fly the C-130 aircraft, and helicopter students fly the UH-1 Huey at their assigned bases or stations.



hyper-competitive, technologically driven, global, knowledge economy.Yesterday's success is no guarantee for a better tomorrow.

What we once had is now gone. We are confronting a new

reality. Claiming we were the Arsenal of Democracy, or the state that put the world on wheels, is wonderful from a nostalgic perspective but it does not pay the mortgage, make the Visa payment or educate our chil-

Conceptually, we need to make job creation the hub of the wheel and identify all the strong spokes we can connect to develop a comprehensive action plan to drive this state forward. Leaders from the private sector should call on the governor and legislative leaders to host a "Shared Vision/Common Agenda" economic summit before the end of the year to develop a comprehensive Michigan Jobs Action Plan. Leaders from the Legislature and private sector, along with the governor, would jointly select the group of thinkers and doers to participate. This group would be charged for setting and implementing a "change agenda" to get our state working again.

I believe the foundation and business community would gladly step up to fund the facilitators and recorders needed to orchestrate the egos and ideas that would come to the table as long as there was commitment to change and action, and clearly identified outcomes that create measurable goals and strategies for next steps.

- Is there an international export and tourism plan to take advantage of emerging markets in the Golden BRIC (Brazil, Russia. India, China) and other hot rising economic markets around the

Proverbs 29:18 tells us, "That without a vision - the people will perish." We need, a vision and the collective bipartisan public and private, collaborative, service leadership to develop an action plan that casts off ideological bickering and finds a way to get the job done for the citizens of this state that are hurting and losing

The crisis facing our state should be the glue to bind us together and develop sensible actions to address the harsh realities at hand.

If anyone tells you such a plan already exists - ask to see the results.

'God bless you' - Baghdad chaplain gives words of encouragement to U.S. soldiers

Military chaplains are a vital part of a Soldier's everyday life. They look after service members' spiritual wellbeing as well as their morale. The chaplain is the one person Soldiers can open up to without worry of consequence.

On any given day, Soldiers working on Camp Liberty are likely to walk past a grey-mustached Army captain who, with a salute, will render a friendly "God Bless You" to them as he walks by.

Capt. Timothy Meier is a chaplain, a scholar and a wise

For Meier, a Catholic priest who serves with 142nd Chaplains Detachment, California Army National Guard, currently attached to the chaplain's office, 4th Infantry Division, Multi-National Division – Baghdad, he said he felt it was his calling to serve this role to the Soldier.

"In the summer of 2005, I made a 30-day silent retreat called the Spiritual Exercises of Saint Ignatius Loyola," said Meier, a Northville native. "In the course of the retreat, it became clear to me that I was being asked to join the Army, which was not at all what I had ever seen myself doing. And so, it was a big surprise and something of a concern for me since I was never a big fan of war. But I could see that the need for Catholic chaplaincy was very great, and if I could be of service, then that's what I feel I needed to do.

For Meier, joining the Army at the age of 50 was a far cry from what he had been spending the majority of his years doing. He had been through what he called the "37th grade" in school. He earned a bachelor's degree in biology and music from Kalamazoo College, followed by a master's degree in philosophy from Loyola University in Chicago. At Georgetown he received a Bachelor of Science in biology (immunology) as well as master's degrees in Divinity and Theology from the Weston Jesuit School of Theology. He also holds a doctorate in biological sciences (molecular neurobiology) from Stanford with postdoctorate work in molecular virology at Stanford and Yale.

Even with a life dedicated to higher education and being the devout believer he is, he said he couldn't change what he felt God wanted him to do.

Once Meier signed the papers to join the military, the consummate researcher in him took over and he researched Army Knowledge Online and did the online courses to become familiar with the skill sets that anyone who has attended basic training would learn.

He went to Chaplain Basic Officer Leader Course at Fort Jackson, S.C., where he found out that the Army was one institution he had very little knowledge about. He also discovered that he would be facing a bigger challenge than even a lack of knowledge: Age.

"I'm old," Meier stated, "and

my body is falling apart."

He had both shoulders operated on shortly after he joined the Army and, 90 days after his surgery, he had to take an Army Physical Fitness Test. He passed despite his recovering shoulders, bad knees, bad feet and arthritis.

"Another challenge was just learning another language," he said. "The Army has a language unto itself as well as the culture, which was different from anything I had been associated with up to that point."

After the Power Point presentations, "stress tests," and road marches and hours of classes of his initial training, Meier is now in Iraq, still learning the ropes but with help from his assistant and from those he works along-side.

I find myself doing a lot of training," said Sgt. 1st Class Matthew McGee, chaplain's assistant to Meier, who also serves with 142nd Chaplains Det. McGee said he and Meier are always going over what to do in certain situations and discussing details on how to go through a firing maneuver together since Meier doesn't carry a weapon. McGee is a perfect fit to assist Meier, having served 15 years in the Army on active duty and almost another 15 years as a part of the reserve

component.
"What makes [Meier] a good chaplain is that he relates well with Soldiers," said McGee. "He is pretty versatile at talking to people at their level, and as a leader. I appreciate that he asks my opinions on issues and he is humble enough to ask the opinion of other officers."

Most Soldiers don't know Meier by name but recognize him by his "God Bless You" greeting as they salute in passing. Meier sees his trademark greeting as more than simply an encouraging word.

"I look on that as a way of doing something that I can do for somebody else, which is praying," he said. "I believe even if that other person doesn't have faith, my God can still bless the person, and I like to make that known. community, whom I really respect a lot, greeted people that way and I thought, 'Wow, that is a really neat way to interact with people.' here without family and friends, and we are in more danger than we might be elsewhere if we were in the States, so I figure the more prayer, the better."


When Meier isn't guiding the souls of Soldiers or serving his duties in the Society of Jesus, he works in California as a biology professor at Stanford University.



tainly will serve them in the best and most diligent way possible," Banner said. "I'm overwhelmed by their support and thrilled to be back on (the board). I worked hard for it (the win), and I'm hopeful that I can do a good job for everybody."

"I appreciate all those who voted for me, and I'm pleased to be back for another four years," said Gans, who will be serving his fourth term on the board, starting in 1996.

"I'm glad to be working for the community and the people," he said. "That's what it's all about. Hopefully, their faith in me will be rewarded."

"I would like to congratulate all of the candidates," Roosen said, "and I'm looking forward to getting back to work."

Poenisch said she knew an hour after the polls closed that the numbers weren't looking good for her. With seven precincts out of 15 reporting by about 9 p.m., she was down by several hundred votes.

"I was grateful to both the Democrats and Republicans in Northville who voted for me, and I will continue to be active in Northville issues," Poenisch said, "I still want to contribute."

SCHOOL BOARD

Incumbent president Joan Wadsworth gathered the most votes, 6,970, in the race for two four-year seats on the Northville Public Schools Board of Education. The other winner was Dottie Garrity with 5,840. She edged out Carol Grimmer's 5,418 while Jacob Espinosa finished with 3,872.

Thank you to everyone who ran," said Wadsworth, a 15year member of the board. "If folks didn't step up to run, we wouldn't have a campaign - and a campaign is a good thing for the district. We have some challenges, in terms of financing and in terms of continuing to be a terrific district ... We learned that we can do a better job of communicating, but we are coming from a position of strength. It's a great district and the community recognizes that."

Challenger Garrity cast her own ballot around 8:45 Tuesday morning and then visited quite

She says better communication is her top priority.

"Whether it's using the tools we currently have, like ListServe, or modifying the way we get information from the public," she said, "whatever it is, we need to somehow communicate better with our public and vice versa."

STATE REP. 20TH DISTRICT

State Rep. Marc Corriveau, D-Northville, has won a second two-year term in the state House with a win over Republican challenger Jerry Vorva of Plymouth.

Corriveau won in every one of the five communities the 20th House represents to win re-election. Corriveau beat Vorva in Plymouth 3,019-2,037; Plymouth Township 8,710-7,146; Canton 3,691-1,490; Northville Township 8,244-7,396; Northville 1,025-655; and in Wayne 5,704-1,938.

"We really worked hard and it's very gratifying," said Corriveau. "I learned not to take anything for granted. When I got the job two years ago I was committed to work as hard as I could and earn the right to go back to Lansing. I want to reach across the aisle and move Michigan forward."

35TH DISTRICT COURT JUDGE

Jim Plakas of Northville Township has been elected to the 35th District Court bench to succeed John MacDonald, who is retiring Jan. I.

Plakas beat Joe Barone by an unofficial total of 34,954-31.802 to win the 6-year term. It was Plakas' win in Northville Township by a 7,523-4,733 margin that catapulted him to the win. Plakas also won in Canton Township and Northville, while Barone was successful in Plymouth and Plymouth Township.

VOTERS' COMMENTS

Outside city hall in downtown Northville Tuesday evening, three women, including Dorothy Corriveau, 45, state Rep. Marc Corriveau's stepmother, were assisting voters at the polls. "This is a great election,"

Corriveau said. "We've had record voter turnouts and beautiful weather."

Beth Lee, 36, of Livonia, said she thought the election was really exciting.

"I think it's an important elec-

tion for the country," she said. Melanie Sheridan, 50, of Farmington Hills, said, "I think it's really great that everyone's coming out (to vote). This is the most exciting election I've seen in my lifetime. Everybody is really interested in it, and you don't ever see that. People are talking about it, and young people are really involved."

And, the other winners in Tuesday's election are ...

So, we must ask, did you vote on Tuesday? If so, pat yourself on the back. You're the winner in this election.

Why? Because you voted. Whether you stood in long lines at the polls, or voted by absentee ballot, you helped make

For many, the lure was the presidential race. The onceevery-four-years event always brings out more voters than in the off years. The fact that so many registered voters in Northville Township and the City of Northville cast their votes in Tuesday's election is good news. But it would be even better if every registered voter in the area had done so. It's a clerk's dream come true to one day report that there was 100 percent participation.

We can only speculate as to why many people don't take an interest in who is running their township, state and national governments and school boards. And we can only hope that one day they will see the light and get involved in the election process.

As for that process, it happens because of the clerks and an army of election workers who work from the wee hours of the morning until late night, making sure everyone who shows up to vote, does; and that every vote gets counted. We can grouse all we want about the long wait, but it is these election workers who keep those lines moving.

These workers at polling places are the backbone of an election. They make sure everything is done right. They deserve a big thank you for what they did on Tuesday.

To all the people who decided to run, the incumbents and the challengers, we say thank you. Our election process works when people get involved. Running for an elective office is no easy job.

To all the people who took the time to vote, we also say thank you. Sorting through the political rhetoric, especially at the national level, was no easy task. You have spoken, the winner has been declared.

But we ask you to remain involved in the election process. Don't wait another four years. There are plenty of elections between now and then for you to express an opinion at the ballot box. Let's aim for 100 percent voting each and every

Don't aid the emerald ash borer by moving firewood

Since it first appeared in southeast Michigan in 2002, the emerald ash borer has spread across the state at an alarming rate.

More than just a pest, this exotic bug from China has devastated our state's ash trees. It is estimated that the metallic green insect has damaged or killed more than 25 million ash trees in Michigan and at least five other states, with southeast Michigan being the epicenter of the infestation and the hardest hit.

Most of us in metro Detroit have seen the damage firsthand. Many neighborhood streets once lined with stately ash trees now stand bare. Parks and golf courses have also been hit hard. In fact, there aren't many ash trees left in the original six-county quarantine area of southeast

It is clear, based on how quickly it has spread, that the emerald ash borer is pretty adept at moving on its own. Unfortunately, it has been aided by careless or ignorant people who have transported dead ash materials, usually in the form of firewood, to other parts of the state (and nation).

Just last week, state agricultural officials confirmed an isolated emerald ash borer infestation in the Upper Peninsula's Schoolcraft County. Schoolcraft is now the fourth county in the UP to have confirmed cases of the destructive pest. State officials believe all the cases are a result of transported fire-

Because of its rapid spread, the state has continuously expanded its quarantine area, which makes it illegal to transport any hardwood firewood or other hardwood materials out of the area. The Level I quarantine area includes 21 contiguous counties of southeast Michigan. The Level II quarantine area, which includes the remainder of the Lower Peninsula, means people can only move hardwood materials into the Level I quarantine area.

Individuals or businesses found violating the quarantine are subject to fines ranging from \$1,000 to \$250,000 and jail time of up to five years.

With the firearms deer hunting season right around the corner, downstaters will be traveling north to their hunting camps. Many might be tempted to take their firewood with them. If you're thinking about it, don't do it. The millions of ash trees in northern Michigan are at risk, and state officials are doing everything they can to stop the spread of this destructive insect, including cracking down on those who violate the quarantine.

Don't move firewood. Buy firewood when you reach your destination and burn it all on site. There are no more excuses.



Voters fill all booths and a lot of the 14 seats available at Northville's Precinct 1 inside Northville City Hall. By 11:45 a.m. Tuesday, 577 votes were cast at the precinct.

Tax confusion

In the Oct. 16 edition, there was an article titled "Township to rein in spending as taxable value falls". The sidebar in that article listed the highest taxpayers in Northville and the township's portion. Besides the fact that the article fails to mention to what year these taxes should be attributed, a search of the tax records finds that the numbers do not correlate to any year for any of the taxpayers listed. In addition to the numbers not matching, it would seem appropriate to include the money that goes to parks and recs and to the schools in this calculation, neither of which was obviously included.

In addition, there was another recent article titled "Tax Tribunal rules on former hospital property", in which it was reported that the hospital property now has a State Equalized Value of \$10 million and a taxable value of \$5 million. It further goes on to state "The taxable value of all property in the state of Michigan is half the amount of the State Equalized Value." Neither of these statements is true, verified by both the tax records and a simple understanding of Michigan property taxes. The SEV is considered to be half of "market value". The taxable value should be equal to the SEV except in cases where the property tax cap has limited taxable value growth over time (it is capped at the lesser of inflation or 5 percent per year).

The following is a response to Mr. Caruana's letter from Thelma Kubitskey, assistant manager/finance director for Northville Township:

In the consent agreement a new taxable and SEV valuation for the REIS Property was agreed upon by both parties; however, the township could not change the value of this property until it (was) ruled on by Michigan Tax Tribunal. The Michigan Tax Tribunal did not rule on this case until October 22, 2008, which was after the 2009 budget process. The tax revenue given for the 2009 budget year was not misrepresented because at the time of the budget process that was the tax roll values. Now that we have a ruling from the Michigan Tax Tribunal, the valuation on this property has changed which reduced the township's tax roll revenues and takes this property off the top 10 taxpayers.

As for the REIS summer 2008 tax bill, this bill was calculated on the old taxable values. REIS paid their 2008 summer tax bill as a partial payment because they were waiting for the decision of the Michigan Tax Tribunal. Any resident of Northville Township can make a partial payment on their taxes. Hopefully, this will correct Mr. Caruana information.

LEGISLATIVE UPDATE

Lame-duck session offers opportunities to spur Michigan's economy, entrepreneurship and education

After the election, the Legislature is in a "lame-duck" session until the end of December, which means that in a very short time we will try to finish our legislative agenda. One of the ramifications of this session is that after the new year, any bills that weren't passed or defeated will have to be reintroduced. With that in mind, I will be focusing my energy on passing several proposals currently in the Senate or House before the end of the year, while others I will reintroduce in January.

My focus will be on the three "E's": economy, entrepreneurship

and education.



Therefore, I will continue to work to address serious problems with the Michigan Business Tax (MBT). Senate Bill 1038, which I sponsored, will correct a structural problem in the MBT by eliminating double taxation with the collection of sales tax imbedded in the base of gross receipts as well as eliminate bad debt from being taxed. The measure will provide tax relief to an estimated 50,000 Michigan job providers.

SB 1242 addresses the onerous 22-percent MBT surcharge, gradually eliminating it over

three years. This past spring, a subcommittee I created held hearings across the state. Everywhere we went, the elimination of the surcharge was the number-one priority.

Another significant piece of legislation is SB 1535, which will

place a \$50 million yearly limit on Michigan's film credits available under the MBT. I was the only Michigan policymaker to vote against the refundable tax credit. The law's refundability means that if a company's credits are more than its tax liability, the state will send the company a refund check. The nonpartisan Senate Fiscal Agency analyzes that this will cost the general fund \$122 million this year on up to \$200-300 million in subsequent years. This year alone the film tax "handout" is closely equivalent to increases in K-12 education and Medicaid. SB 1535 currently caps the film credits at \$50 million and will save the state millions of dollars that could be used to lower the tax burden across the board, invest in schools, reduce tuition at our public universities, and support transportation improvements. In my opinion, we can't afford an unlimited "giveaway" to one industry.


Importantly, another bill (SB 1198) would increase the number of small businesses that are able to take advantage of the lower 1.8 percent MBT alternative tax rate. Specifically, owner compensation would increase to \$250,000 from \$180,000 and the Adjusted Business Income would increase from \$1.3 million to \$1.5 million. Passage of this bill would mean an additional 15,000 companies would qualify for relief.

Finally, focusing on helping young people become successful learners able to compete in a global economy depends on early intervention of learning difficulties before children begin to struggle and fail. Waiting until high school to intervene is too late. My initiative known as SAVE the Children (SB 1039) is a recognized process to give students the best opportunities for academic success.

All these bills now await action and my goal is to see them through to conclusion.

Coldwater Springs Project coming along

Northville Township will soon be adding another park to its recreational inventory.

The \$600,000 Coldwater Springs Nature Area Linear Park Project being developed along Johnson Creek is moving along, with work scheduled to be completed next spring. The nature area is located off of Ridge Road between Five Mile and Six Mile roads.

"The contractor is wrapping up the boardwalk and fishing deck construction," said Traci Sincock, director of Northville Parks and Recreation. "The drinking fountain has been installed, and the concrete has been poured for the information kiosk at the entrance on Ridge Road."

A "Park Coming Soon" sign has been erected informing residents that the park is getting closer to becoming a reality.

"I'm getting lots of calls from residents who have noticed the sign and want to know more about the park," Sincock said.

The area is located on the east side of Ridge Road along Johnson Creek - the only cold water tributary of the Rouge River, hence the name Coldwater Springs.

The park connects to a Pulte Homes development, Arcadia Ridge, and walking trails are proposed along the creek.

About \$303,000 of the project is being funded with a grant from the Michigan Department of Natural Resources Trust Fund. The value of work being donated by Pulte Homes is about \$260,000, with the balance of the project to be paid by the town-

"The township looks forward to the completion of the Coldwater Springs Nature Area Linear Park Project next spring, said Mark Abbo, township supervisor, 'The project is the culmination of a successful public/private partnership which will provide easy pedestrian access and allow our residents to enjoy this beautiful natural area and the Johnson Creek, the only cold water trout stream in southeast Michigan."

A man was arrested for operating while intoxicated at 1:16 a.m. Sept. 10 at Six Mile and Haggerty roads.



Police responded to a forcedentry burglary attempt at a home on Woodcreek Boulevard at 11:05 a.m. on Sept. 8.



Election proves we can't just continue doing business as usual

he election is over at last. And though we are still digesting the results, it is possible to make some sense of the underlying patterns beneath a truly remarkable outpouring of civic engagement in action and at the polls.

This much is certain: In itself, this election is unlikely to change any of Michigan's fundamental problems - with one big excep-

Redistricting: The foundation for which party

controls power is determined by who draws the boundaries for legislative districts. Michigan's

current frame-

work was set in 1998, when John Engler's huge third-term victory led a Republican sweep of both houses of the legislature, meaning the GOP would have the upper hand when district lines were reset following the 2000

The process resulted in a durable Republican tilt to the state sen-ate that today is 21-17 — despite 54 percent of the vote being cast for the Democrats two years ago. House districts were supposed to be gerrymandered Republican, but the designers didn't do as well.

Over the years Democrats steadily chipped away and, going into this election, held control of the lower chamber, 58-52.

Fast forward to this Tuesday. A combination of Barack Obama's coattails and Kalamazoo philanthropist John Stryker's \$3.5 million have resulted in sweeping Democratic gains in the next House. These are likely to endure without major changes through the election of 2010 and have a big impact on the redistricting process that will begin in earnest the next year, after the new census

That year, regardless of which party controls the governor's office, Democrats are unlikely to be steamrollered again. But sadly, when it comes to the rest of our problems, as the French say, "The" more things change, the more they stay the same."

Included among those prob-

Our Chronic Structural Deficit. We will continue to face a chronic structural deficit in the state's General Fund. The respected Citizens Research Council estimates that this deficit, left unaddressed, will balloon to nearly \$10 billion by 2017.

That's a little more than this year's entire general fund.

This estimate doesn't take account of what's likely to be a long and severe national recession one that will look a lot like the one we experienced in the early 1980s, when Michigan's unemployment rate peaked at 13.9 percent in July 1980. And it doesn't project what might happen if General Motors buys Chrysler, shuts a lot of plants and fires thousands of workers. The Lansingbased Anderson Economic Group last week estimated total firstround job loss at around 30,000, with more than half those in Michigan.

Given the fact that increasing taxes is neither economically or politically possible, some candidates for the Michigan House of Representatives and other Lansing insiders have been talking about ways to save a hundred million here, a hundred million

Nice sentiment - but it won't even begin to scratch the surface of the deeper budget deficit prob-

Fundamental Redesign of the Economy. For decades, when people thought about Michigan's economy, they started and ended with manufacturing in general and the auto industry in particu-

Today, it is a not-very-brave new world. Michigan has lost around 400,000 manufacturing jobs over the past decade, the majority of them in the auto industry. A state accustomed to the auto companies providing low-skill, high-wage jobs has had difficulty in adjusting to the idea that these jobs are gone forever.

Sure, likely there will be a domestic auto company or two left after the carnage. But those companies will continue to shed jobs by the thousands as they downsize to meet new market realities.

And increasingly, some people are wondering if it makes any sense to base a strategy for our economic future on autos.

Autos will continue to play a big role in our economy. After all, there are more skilled automotive engineers in Michigan than anywhere else in the world. They will be adding value to product design, technology innovations, and manufacturing know-how for years. Yet on balance, the auto industry is likely to be a net job loser in the years to come. We need to think beyond the ending of an era.

The Path to Prosperity: Diversification, Entrepreneurship.

Even gross economic statistics suggest that communities in Michigan that have succeeded in diversifying their economies are doing better than those still hopelessly dependent on the auto

Indeed, for nearly a century, autos have dominated southeastern Michigan's economy. But according to the Michigan Department of Labor and Economic Growth, August unemployment in auto-dominated counties was high: Detroit/ Western Wayne/Macomb was 8.8 percent and Flint was 10.5 percent. By contrast, more diversified areas were better off: Ann Arbor at 6.4 percent, Kalamazoo at 7.1 percent, and Grand Rapids at 7.4

So how do economies diversify? One sure route is through new business start-ups. Whether it's high-tech companies fueled by discoveries coming out of university labs or ordinary run-of-themill startups, experts agree the great majority of new jobs will come from small and new businesses, not our aging behemoths.

An economic development strategy aimed at chasing big smokestacks may get the headlines, but it is not likely to be successful over the long run as one focused on helping new companies get started and attracting entrepreneurs to start them.

We've just had a dramatic, game-changing election, and in Michigan, especially, this year merely serves to prove the rule: We cannot continue to be, or do, business as usual.

Are you a young and responsible woman?

Grace is a 17-year-old who I saw in consultation for birth control. In the midst of our conversation I started talking to her and her mother about HPV, the potential risks of the infection and the vaccine.

"Why bother", Grace asked me, "it's a shot and it hurts!"
"Its one of those things to do

to keep healthy", I explained. HPV stands for Human Papilloma Virus. This virus can infect the genital area of sexually active men and women. Most HPV types cause no symptoms and go away on their own. However some

types of HPV can cause cervical cancer.

According to the CDC (Centers for Disease Control and Prevention), worldwide an estimated 493,000 new cases of cervical cancer occur each year, and of them 274,000 women die annually from cervical cancer. It is very important to get tested for cervical cancer (pap smear) because 6 of 10 cases occur in women who have never received a Pap test or have not been tested in

the previous five years

The first vaccine, Gardisil, is shown to target the high risk subtypes of HPV offers protection against cervical cancer. The vaccine also protects against genital dysplasia and genital warts associated with low-risk subtypes of the virus. It is a 3-dose vaccine approved for use in girls/women aged 9-26 years at 0, 2 and 6 month schedule. It is not known yet whether booster doses will be required in the future.

Since the vaccine only covers some high-risk types of HPV, about 30 percent of cervical

cancers will not be prevented by the vaccine. So I recommend that regular annual pap smears be continued even after vaccination. The Pap test can detect cell changes in the cervix before they turn into cancer. It is unclear how much protection girls/women would get from receiving only one or two doses of the vaccine. For this reason, it is very important to get all the three doses of the vaccine. Many states have introduced legislation to require, fund or educate the public about the vaccine and some of them have enacted them in some form or other. Michigan was the first to introduce the legislation to require the HPV vaccine for girls entering sixth grade, but the bill is still pending.

Use of condoms at all times and in the right way offers protection against HPV, but does not completely eliminate transmission. Condoms

also prevent transmission of other HPV related infections of the genital tract. The only sure way to prevent HPV is to abstain from all sexual activity. Mutually monogamous sexual relationships lessen the risk of acquiring the infection.

Despite widespread efforts at educating populations about the vaccine, many people are unaware of the link between cervical cancer and the virus. Other hurdles faced are the high cost and inconvenience of the required three shots, the low number of regular physician visits and reluctance among the younger age group, and parents' unease at immunizing their children against a disease acquired by sexual activity. According to the American National Cancer Institute, "widespread vaccination has the potential to reduce cervical cancer deaths around the world by as much as two-thirds, if all women

were to take the vaccine and if protection turns out to be long-term. In addition, the vaccines can reduce the need for medical care, biopsies and invasive procedures associated with the follow-up from abnormal Pap tests, thus reducing health care costs and anxieties related to abnormal Pap smears and follow-up procedures"



I hear so much about body fat loss, what kind of body fat reading is most accurate?

The only true accurate measurement would be the direct method or cadaver analysis (i.e. when you are dead, but then you couldn't do much with the information!).

All that said, underwater weighing is considered the gold standard. However. not many people wish to be

dunked in cold water in their bathing suits, making the test impractical and expensive. Additionally this test is not easy for the technician and leaves room for many errors such as the subject's hydration status, and protein and mineral content at the time of measurement.

All other measurements have the same difficulty in delivering consistent accu-

racy: too many variables that need to be controlled during the measurement. For example, you can get a body fat reading from a Bioimpedance tool (scale or other machines) in the morning and a completely different reading later in the day.

Therefore, most fitness professionals end up using the tried and true skin fold assessment technique (pinching the skin with calipers) when working with fat loss because it is portable, inexpensive and less invasive and gives you a "very close to the same reading" under all conditions. This makes skin-fold calipers an ideal assessment tool for determining body fat in any population (other than the very obese in which it's better to use circumference measurements).

Bottom line: when dealing with measuring body fat for monitoring your progress, one-time pin-point accuracy is not nearly as important as the consistency of the measurement device because when it comes to altering body composition, at the end of the day, no one cares how accurate the initial number is (although it will always be very close under any circumstance with the skin fold). One only cares that the body fat measurement is moving in the direction you are working toward.
