# Light 'em up: Taft Road to see brighter days

## Acorn LED technology used

Motorist on Taft Road will have better visibility in the near future with some new lighting fixtures chosen by city council members Monday night.

Agreeing with the recommendation of Jim Gallogly, director of public works, council approved the placement of eight street lights at the intersection of Taft Road and Morgan Boulevard.

The lights will feature a decorative acorn luminaire with an LED (light-emitting diode) engine on a 14-foot tapered, fluted Washington-styled poles. The fixtures from Carrier and Gable, Inc., of Farmington Hills, which are manufactured by Lumecon, also of Farmington Hills, will cost about \$21,000. Carrier and Gable is a local traffic signal

and lighting company.
It it estimated that it will cost an additional \$9,000 to install the lights and provide underground power. The lights will be installed at the

Annual energy cost for the lights will be less than \$2,000, according to Gallogly.

The advantages of this option, which was one of four choices considered by council, are that the lights will provide attractive, low-level lighting; calm traf-fic; produce efficient lighting with low maintenance; and the lighting system will be owned and controlled by the city.

The disadvantages are that this was one of the more costly options of the four; the city must arrange for light installation; and the city will have to perform any maintenance on the lights.

Council also suggested having the manufacturer explore adding some brackets on the poles in case the city wants to hang some banners from the lighting fixtures. This would only be a nominal increase in the cost.

"I would consider this a pilot program for the city as far as lighting," Gallogly said.

LED lights are more energy-efficient than the high pressure sodium vapor lights, and then there's the issue of having to have DTE Energy replace the bulbs with the sodium vapor lights.

Energy costs are going up," said Tim Dewitt of Carrier and Gable. "And, the LED light is so different from what we're used to," noting that retailers often use the LED lights because colors are more brilliant to shoppers.

He believes the LED lights offer a safer alternative for drivers, especially senior citizens, who Dewitt said often have diminished peripheral vision compared to younger drivers. LED lights will also have no effect on the nearby residential area.

'If weather permits, we could get these in soon," Gallogly said.

Councilman Doug Bingham supported the LED fixtures because they're money savers.

"We need to conserve energy," Bingham said.

# Cooke students finding their voices

#### Corporation's employees help raise funds to buy equipment

Students at Cooke school have many special needs, but with the help of a local corporation, their voices are being heard.

Mitsubishi Electric Automotive America (MEAA) raises charitable contributions from their employees - donating them to the school to purchase communication equipment for non-verbal students.

Cooke is a secondary school for severely impaired students ages 11 to 26-years old. 160 students are enrolled there. The

school's goal is to prepare them for supportive employment.

Marilynn Bachorik, school principal, described the computerized boxes as augmentative communication devices. Cost varies from \$40 and up, into the hundreds of dollars. Some students may need the simpler model, while others may require one offering pictures and more

'Cooke students have been recipients of almost \$20,000 worth of equipment from MEAA since 2002," Bachorik said. "Given a chance, people like to be generous in a

personal way and that's one reason they give to us."

An annual Christmas party is held for students and their families, alumni and family, and staff. MEAA helps share the cost, serves the dinner, and gifts are handed out to students. Other events are held throughout the year as well.



of Providence for women with disabilities. When that closed in 2002, someone in our department knew about MEAA and that they wanted to continue doing something in this area," Case said.

She was amazed at their willingness to help.

"They asked what they could do for us. I've been in education for 20 years and no one has ever said that to us," Case said. "They want specifically not to hand us money at a distance. They want to interact and know our students"

We've found a lot of students understand more than we would have known without the devices. They want a say in what's going on in their life, the device makes it possible. And it's pretty profound when you see them using it."

Case shared why such devices are instrumental in helping the students.

"Imagine not being understood when you try to speak. Something as simple as placing an order at a fast food restaurant for most of us takes only a minute, if that. Imagine not having the ability to order in a clear and concise manner," she said.

With the push of some buttons, a digital or synthesized voice is activated.

"Maybe mom and dad know what they're saying, and those who know them well,

Others wouldn't understand them, and those in the restaurant don't understand," Case said. "So if I have to order for them, people think they're not capable of ordering."

Aside from the communication devices, MEAA provided funds to the school's Gym teach for Special Olympics, for large tricycles and pedal vehicles with extra safety features. and other needs as well.

Northville Township. "Our students don't just learn sitting in a desk. They have to feel it, touch it, and go through the motion of doing it. It takes them longer to learn - but when you give them all the learning experiences they retain it and learn better," Case said.

She believes these devices help students gain confidence, spean more clearly as they hear the devices, and become more independent.

"If they can order lunch at the Food Court in the Mall, Case said, they also learn how to pay for something and get change. They learn to communicate in a way they couldn't before.

Paul Poe, senior production control at MEAA in Northville, is heavily involved with Cooke and their students. Through Mitsubishi Electric America Foundation (www. meaf.org), grants are provided to students with disabilities.

Poe says their goal is to improve the lives of people with disabilities, particularly the young, enabling them to reach their potential and participation in society.

When you meet the special students at Cooke School, it isn't difficult to do what you can for them and their families," Poe said. "The faculty and administration there are fantastic and the smiles you get in return from both students and adults make it all worthwhile. As a volunteer, if you can make a difference by donating just a small amount of your time, you get paid back tenfold with smiles and appreciation."





# Football games are just one of many performance opportunities

#### Marching band and drumline draw many



MARCHING BAND
The Northville High School marching band has been averaging over 200 members for a decade, making them one of the largest in the state. They perform all styles of music from all periods, and they study a variety of composers, from classical composers Beethoven, Mozart, Shostakovich and Host to hard rock's

Marching band is a brass ensemble that includes all band students - Symphonic Band 9, Symphonic Band 10, Symphonic Band 11-12, and Jazz Ensemble 1 and 2.

The marching band prepares for the home football season at a band camp that begins two weeks before the start of school from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. weekdays. After that, the marching band - which includes drum majors, flag corps co-captains, assistant drum majors, drum captains, color guard, and equipment managers - rehearse three and a half hours once a week after school and during compulsory band classes, which convene every other day for 90 minutes.

That heavy rehearsing schedule pumps out a marching band that entertains audiences at each home game during the football pregame shows, halftime shows and postgame shows. In addition, marching band performs in downtown Northville each year in parades

for Victorian Festival, Christmas, Memorial Day and Forth of July.

At the end of each school year, students audition to be one of the four drum majors, or to become an assistant major or an equipment

manager, and to establish the student leaders. Each student demonstrates their abilities in conducting, vocal and whistle commands and all the basics of marching.

"They work very hard to get these positions,"

said director Mike Rumbell. "Kids do it because they love music and performing. It takes time and discipline, but they actually want to do it."

At the end of each school year, students wishing to perform in drumline receive their music for the following year and practice individually over the summer. Then, in August during band camp, they audition before Rumbell to be a part of this prestigious, extra-curricular ensemble.

Drumline is completely led by students who create, design and write their own show. Eight snare drums, eight bass drums and two quint sets, totaling 18 performers, make up this percussion ensemble which plays at pep rallies and the postgame show at home football games. Seniors Evan Havlisch and Griffin Working

are this year's captains; both are quint players. Working said he chose to be in drumline simply

because drumming, at this point, is a hobby.

But, it would be cool if I could turn it into some sort of living," he said.

Havlisch, who also drums just as a hobby, said being in drumline means you "get to be around a bunch of cool people all the time." When not playing in the drumline, Havlisch can be found playing at his church, Hope Lutheran in Farmington Hills, every third Sunday each month.

"Kids in drumline work hard," said director Johanne Ray-Hepp. "They practice after their jazz and marching band rehearsals, often playing until late in the evening."



hat began circa 1955 as the Northville Jazz Program, one of the oldest jazz programs in the state, has since gained statewide acclaim, often times reaching professional level performances. NHS now has two jazz bands, referred to as Jazz Ensemble I and II.

Jazz Ensemble I has had at least three straight decades of receiving the highest rating at state festivals. Jazz Ensemble I has been invited to play at the Detroit International Jazz Festival on Labor Day for 23 straight years, plus four other times before that, sharing the same space as the professional players.

Students must audition to get into this advanced level band, and those who don't make it go into Jazz Ensemble II, a beginner to intermediate level band. Though Jazz Ensemble l'accepts all grade levels, it averages one or two freshmen per year.

The instruments played in jazz ensemble are trombones, trumpets, saxophones, bass guitar, drum set, piano and, on occasion,

Last year, five students from Jazz Ensemble I made it to the MSBOA (Michigan School Band and Orchestra Association) All-State Jazz Ensemble. Zach Thomas on trumpet, Tony Pizzimenti on trumpet, Brian Earle on trombone, Michael LaCivita on bass trombone, and Yonglu Che on alto saxophone were each selected, and honorable mention was given to Nathan Love on the tenor saxophone.

"Our group made up 20 percent of the MSBOA All-State Jazz Ensemble, meaning these were the best students at their instrument position in the state," said director Mike Rumbell.

Zack Thomas won a \$500 scholarship for best jazz soloist in the high school category at the





# Choir directors sing a similar song

mpoverished beginnings and the will to follow dreams make for the best success stories, especially when told with brutal honesty. Mark Krempski and Matt Laura, beloved and talented NHS choir directors, have parallel stories that unfold raw and

#### MARK KREMPSKI

Having grown up in Catholic schools, Krempski sang all the time. He took private violin lessons from the fifth grade to the ninth, but the musical

road wasn't always smooth.

I quit the orchestra in ninth grade because they were forcing me to do a solo competition at festivals," said Krempski. "I quit because I didn't want the pressure."

As a freshman, Krempski would watch choir performances from afar. In his sophomore year, Krempski joined the choir, and after having fallen in love with the program, the director, who happened to be his mother's choir teacher, retired at the end of that year. Krempski would then clash with the new director.

"I'm sure I purposely annoyed her at every opportunity," he said with a laugh. "I'd sing harmony when I was supposed to sing in unison. It worked. She was annoyed and I got kicked out." And then he was back.

"I went to the secretary and accompanist and said, 'I'm valuable' and thev told the director that she needs to put up with the adolescent behavior," said Krempski.

After that, his high school career blossomed and he began to have more singing opportunities - in school musicals and in an ensemble choir similar to Northville High School's Back Beat.

There must have been something great about the program that kept me in it," Krempski said.

When not singing, Krempski kept busy in gymnastics, wrestling and foot-ball, with gymnastics being his favorite because it was the most challenging.

"After graduation, I thought I either needed to join the military or study music," he said.

Ultimately, the choice was easy. "Music was always there," he said. "I didn't have a lot of choices coming from a poor Polish/Catholic background in

Italians and Russians.

We were pretty poor, so I didn't have a lot of choices," said Krempski. "My parents were too busy working to help me. They didn't go to college; they just said, 'Do what you want'."

Instead, it was the school counselors who would help guide his course.

In college, Krempski enthusiastically studied music, earning a degree in music education at the University of Illinois. He then taught music in an elementary school in Chicago, but left after two years because he wanted to work with older voices. A graduate degree in choral conducting from Florida State University would eventually lead him to his current position at NHS, but first he would meet the woman of his dreams.

A former student of NHS, she moved back to her roots. Krempski followed her, but fate would have other plans, breaking up the duo and bringing a new love to his life, the NHS choir program. Since arriving 10 years ago, Krempski has received big returns on his investment.

#### MATT LAURA

Matt Laura was always a good student, even though his family would move frequently, causing him to be ready on the fly to change schools and friends.

The longest we stayed in one place was six years," said Laura.

At age 8, Laura took up piano, which served as a lifeboat for his transitional childhood.

accepted at a new school, I always had music to fall back on.'

Laura played football all four years of high school, and engaged in basketball, wrestling and baseball. But really, there wasn't much time for sports or any other after-school activities.

I had to raise my three brothers because my parents were always working," Laura said.

It was his locker partner in his freshman year of high school who would inadvertently set the course for Laura's career. "The guy who sat next to me in band,

we were locker partners, and we were always daring each other to do stupid things, and the rule was you could never back down from a dare."

The dare of the day was to take choir. So Laura, playing by the rules, took

Laura's high school in Milan, Mich., was just starting a choir program, which grew before his eyes from 20 students in his freshman year to 40 students by the time he graduated.

That influenced me a lot in my career to start a choir program and 1725. build it from the ground up," Laura said.

Laura got his chance at a high school in Vandercook Lake, near Jackson. When he arrived in the year 2000, there were two choirs, totaling 21 students. Five years later, Laura had built up the choir to seven choirs, totaling

That's pretty good, considering there were only 600 kids in the entire school," he said.

Laura was the first in his family to graduate from high school (yes, high school). That's a far cry from the near 98 percent of NHS graduates who go on to college. And so the studious choir director, who grew up in conditions far removed from the kids growing up in Northville, landed a job at NHS in 2005.

"My goals for my students are similar to their own goals for themselves," said Laura. "Music for me was never the goal; it is just what makes everything else manageable."

Laura has a simple philosophy,

"I sing, I dance all day and I get paid for it," he said. "Mark and I try to get them to recognize the importance of everyone in the class, not just as singers, but as people."

Laura is expecting the birth of his second daughter in January, just over a year from the debut of his first daughter who decided to make her entrance hours before the Fall

"I'm very excited because my own father was sort of non-existent, and now I get to correct that."



#### LETTERS TO THE NORTHVILLE RECORD EDITOR

#### Edenderry error

The procedure that has been followed for the Edenderry/Shadbrook Special Assessment Districts (SAD) has been convoluted and confusing to the affected residents, and the Township erred by approving the petition without following the procedure set forth under Michigan Act 188.

The procedure to be followed under Act 188 is explicit:

- 1. Upon receipt of a petition, the Township should prepare plans and cost estimates;
- 2. Plans ar Township Clerk, the Township shall tentatively declare by resolution that a SAD has been created, and fix a time and place to hear any objections to the SAD;

3. After hearing objections to the SAD, the township board may revise, correct, change or amend the SAD.

In the Edenderry situation, the Township aborted the procedure set forth in the statute. Residents were told in September that once they signed the petition either for or against the SAD, their decision could not be changed. By so declaring, the Township made it clear that the hearing, where objections, concerns, and questions by affected residents could be discussed and considered,

was a sham. When the hearing did take place in October, those who attended were allowed to change their decision, but no notice was given to all Edenderry residents that this was a possibility. Once the word got out to all of the residents, more than 50 percent of them had changed their mind about the feasibility of bearing the entire burden of paying for the repair of affected roads.

The statute is clear that this is exactly the type of information that should be considered at a public hearing before the Township Board makes its decision to approve a SAD petition. In the Edenderry situation, the Township Board ignored the will of a majority of its residents.

The Township Board erred by approving the Edenderry SAD under this procedure. The Board should admit its error and repeal the petition.

Hating the Holidays

Dear Hating, Millions of people experience the holiday blues this time of year, but seniors tend to be especially vulnerable. Here are some suggestions that can help.

#### **HOLIDAY BLUES**

There are lots of factors that can contribute to an older person's sadness or apathy around the holiday season such as the loss of a spouse, sibling or a close friend. Some seniors feel alone and isolated because their grown children and grandchildren live far away. While others may feel blue because of financial concerns, poor health or because they're unable to perform routine holiday activities like shopping, baking or even attending religious services.

#### **HOW TO HELP**

Depending on what's making you mother blue during this holiday season, here are some tips that may help:

- Be a good listener: Talk to your mom about how she's feeling and why. Very often just being able to share feelings with someone can help.

Prevent isolation: **Encourage family members** to be around your mom as much as possible during the holidays. If you can't be there physically, be sure to call more often.

· Find community help: Contact her church or other community resource where someone may be able to stop by for a visit, or pick her up for a religious service or community activity.

Ease her financial guilt: If your mom is on a tight budget, be sure she doesn't feel guilty if she can't afford to buy the grandchildren fancy gifts. It's not what the holidays should

be about. · Lend a helping hand: If poor health or physical limitations are causing her blues lend her a hand with shoppings decorating and other holiday

preparations. Suggest volunteering: Many churches or civic groups would love her help (also see Web sites like www.volunteermatch.org and www.getinvolved.gov <a href="http://www.getinvolved.gov/> to find volunteer opportunities). Helping others is a great way to forget your own troubles.

· Watch the holiday spirits: Alcohol consumption for many people goes up during the holiday season, and alcohol is a depressant that can intensify the problem.

· Go for a walk: Exercise is a natural antidepressant so encourage your mom to go for a daily walk, or if possible, take one with her.

#### **WATCH FOR DEPRESSION**

There's a big difference between feeling sad or blue and being chronically depressed. If your mom's blues linger beyond the holidays into the New Year, she may have a more serious problem. Here are the signs to watch for:

· A persistent feeling of sadness. · Lost interest in hobbies

or activities that she formerly enjoyed.

· Feeling worthless or hopeless.

· Inability to sleep or sleeping too much.

Loss of energy or motiva-

· Not eating or eating too much.

Trouble thinking, concentrating, and making decisions.

· Feeling anxious, restless, or irritable. Thinking about dying or

killing herself. Another good way you can check your mom's mood is by giving her a depression screening test at www.depressionscreening.org <a href="http://">http://</a> www.depressionscreening. org/>. If you find that she's depressed, encourage her to get help beginning with her own doctor. There are a variety of treatment options that can help such as medications, professional counseling or a combination of both.

Dear Granny, Starting a blog is a fun nd stimulating pastime for seniors, not to mention a great way to share wisdoms and make new friends. Here's what you should know.

#### A GROWING TREND

Blogging has never been so popular among boomers and seniors! Today there are literally thousands of bloggers over age 55. In fact, according to the Pew Internet & American Life Project, 5 percent of online U.S. seniors have created a blog, and 20 percent have read someone else's blog.

But before I go any further, a blog (short for Web log) is a personal online journal where you can write about anything or everything that interests you, and you can post pictures, too. (The newest blog entry is always at the top of the page.) Readers can comment on each post, often creating a rich and enlightening conversation.

**HOW TO START** Fortunately, you don't need to know much about technology to get started. If you have a home computer and Internet access you can start your own blog in a matter of minutes and in many cases it's free. Here are some tips to help you get started.

Pick a theme: If you already know you want to blog about cooking you're ahead of the game. Topic driven blogs (writing on something specific) attracts more readers than a personal blogs - which are online diaries for people who want to write about whatever interest them at the time. Personal blogs are fun outlets for seniors who want to keep family and friends informed of what's going on in their lives.

 Choose a name: Pick a short name for your blog that encompasses your theme or identifies with you.

Select a blog hosting service: While there are lots of options to choose from, two good ones are Blogger.com (which is free) and Typepad.com (which charges a minimal fee). Both of these sites are incredibly easy to use, and offer a variety of pre-made templates, color schemes and more that allow you to personalize your blog. If you want more hosting options check out Livejournal.com, JournalHome.com, 360.yahoo. com, WordPress.com, TheDiary. org, Mindsay.com, Blog.com, Blogagotchi.com, Blogdrive. com, Blogidentity.com, Weebly. com and Xanga.com.

Test it out: After you've set

to test it out, and make any adjustments to the layout or

style that you see fit. · Promote your blog: After you get up and running send your friends and family your blogging address so they can visit. And when you visit other blogs of similar interest, build a blogging circle by leaving comments along with your blog address so they can visit you too.

#### **SAVVY TIPS**

When you blog, avoid giving out too much personal information such as your last name, address, phone number, etc. While the Internet can be a wonderful window to the world it can also be a dangerous place. Also, don't feel bad or rejected if no one visits your blog for the first few months. As with anything new on the Internet, it will take some time for your blog to get noticed. But keep in mind that frequent blogging (several times a week) helps attract visitors. ## Start solving problems by better describing policy disputes

#hen we talk about where people stand on the political spectrum, our long-standing practice has been to describe them in terms of being "left" and "right."

But do those terms even make sense any more? Since New Deal days, our habit in America has been to say that Republicans are generally on the right, while Democrats are said to occupy the left.

Extreme conservatives are characterized as "right wingers," while ultra-liberals are called lefties.

So where do these terms come from, anyway? Well, the roots of the practice go back to the French Revolution, when, in the parliament of 1791, politicians who supported the monarchy ("Feuillants") sat on the right hand side of the chamber, while those favoring radical change ("Montagnards") clustered on

That may have made some sense then. But like many

things that are more than 200 years old, this habit of thought has become both rigid and sloppy - and increasingly

inaccurate. I'm beginning to think a far better way of looking at today's political and policy differences is along past-oriented vs. futureoriented lines.

For example, take the labor movement — or some parts of it, anyway. Traditionally, organized labor has been clumped on the left, along with liberals, Democrats and other such. Management has been placed on the right, along with conservatives. But then take a careful look at the way unions and management often behave.

Too often, both sides are working to try and preserve work rules and compensation structures of the past, often

embalmed in a written contract. This has direct relevance to the ongoing problems of the domestic auto makers. While it would be too simplistic to blame all the auto industry's problems on this type of thinking, it is true that labor and management have been historically reluctant to change the way the industry has been organized and run since the 1940s.

That attitude was on sad display last month, when the nation was treated to the sad spectacle of the leaders of the Detroit Three and the United Auto Workers union being pilloried before the Congress as out of touch and unwilling to change.

But big auto is far from the only example. Others include: Beer and Wine: They fight

to protect an old monopoly. For many, many years, the Michigan Beer and Wine Wholesalers Association has been among the most powerful lobbies in Lansing.

Powered by the 70 or so Michigan families that own beer and wine distribution companies, the association has worked to preserve the "three tier" system governing the way beer and wine is sold.

That is a formula that was introduced in the 1930s. Basically, it gave the distributors a monopoly on the distribution and sale of beer and wine — a monopoly they have fiercely defended over the

Yet they began to run into trouble in 2005 and thereafter, when federal courts repeatedly slapped down as unconstitutional the Michigan law protecting this monopoly. Out-of-state wineries and retailers began shipping wine into the state and to individual consumers, though shipments were few and far between and almost entirely of high-end wines to connoisseurs.

Last month, however, the beer and wine lobby reacted, slipping through a House committee a bill that would bar out-of-state retailers - but not wineries - from shipping wine and liquor into Michigan.

The Michigan Liquor Control Commission joined in, fearful of losing its profitable monopoly on selling booze - a monopoly that has resulted in our prices being far higher than those in, for example, Chicago. According to a report from the Michigan Bureau of Elections, the Michigan Beer & Wine Wholesalers

Association political action committee has received contributions of at least \$345,951 this year. That's a lot of dough to spread around, especially to protect the past in the form of a long-standing monopoly that reduces consumer choice and drives up prices.

Great Lakes Shipping: They fight new ways to prevent Great Lakes pollution. Ever since the St. Lawrence Seaway opened the Great Lakes to trans-Atlantic shipping in 1959, there have been repeated instances of seagoing ships dumping their ballast into our lakes as they take on cargo. In the ballast water were various critters that originate elsewhere - Zebra Mussels, Spiny Water Fleas, and Round-headed Gobies, among others.

Here, they have rushed into what must be paradise for them; a new Great Lakes environment with no predators.

For us, not so much. They're called exotic invasives, and best estimate is that a new one gets established in our lakes every six months. The damage has been enormous, and the prob-lem threatens the ecology of the entire Great Lakes system.

Nevertheless, spearheaded by the United States Great Lakes Shipping Association, the industry has fought for years against any attempt to force ships either to dump their ballast at sea or to treat it, so as to kill any organisms that had hitched a ride into

What this means is that the shippers have fought for years to preserve their profits while polluting a lake system that represents some 20 percent of all the earth's surface drinkable fresh water.

Earlier this fall, the Sixth Circuit Court of Appeals upheld Michigan's ballast water statute that obliges ships to obtain state permits and, if the ships discharge water, to treat the water to prevent introduction of invasives. The explicit purpose of the Michigan statute was to protect the Great Lakes for the future.

These two brief examples, neither corresponding to the standard right-left characterization of politics and policy, offer insight into how we might get a better understanding of policy disputes by changing our habits in describing them.

Once we do that, maybe we can then start to actually do something about our prob-







"When we come to compete and when we play hard, there's not a team on our schedule that we don't have a shot at beating.



The new or clean, used coats collected during the month of November will be given to several different charitable organizations, who will then distribute the coats to those most in need at no cost.





# A Sumptuous Spread for the Family

Each holiday season, hosts strive for the percet balance between serving traditional fare and trying out palatepleasing new recipes. Among friends and family however, the classics — which conjure up memories of holidays past — win hands down. Here's a sumptuous spread that's sure to please the whole family.

#### Moist and Savory Stuffing

Prep: 20 minutes Bake: 30 minutes Makes: 11 servings

2 1/2 cups *Swanson* Chicken Broth (Regular, Natural Goodness or
