

Storm rips through town

A severe thunder storm ripped through Northville on June 4, uprooting trees and keeping city workers up until the wee hours of the morning on

Saturday. The story hit about 8 p.m. last Friday night, with the clock by Town Square stuck on 8:35 p.m. for a while when downed wires caused a power outage



Northville plans 4 road projects

Disruption to be minimal for all

The city of Northville will undertake four construction projects this summer, with minor disruptions to be expected for local motorists.

Northville Township doesn't have any construction going on at this point, but there may be some road work coming in the future if residents approve a special assessment district.

CLEMENT ROAD

Clement Road within the city limits, from Lexington Boulevard to Woodhill Road, will receive a complete reconstruction, according to Jim Gallogly, director, Department of Public Works. It will be a concrete road, and the project will include

the entire roadway including the driveway approaches to each home along Clement. Spot repair will be done on sidewalks, and new street signs will be erected.

'It will look like a new road in a subdivision when we're done," Gallogly said. The work will be done half at a time to allow emergency access through the neighborhood. The approximately \$300,000 project will take about six weeks to complete. This project was a special request by the residents on Clement Road, who came to city council and pleaded to have the work approved in this budget year. We had planned this for budget year 2013, which really means we would have done the work in 2012," Gallogly said. "But the residents petitioned us to do the work now due to the poor condition of the road. There's no argument that it's a bad road, and there was enough reserve in the street improvement fund for us to



winds, crashing into homes on Grace and Rayson streets south of Eight Mile Road and east of Center Street. Gawkers could still be seen driving by the next day, with Grace Street closed to through traffic until cleanup could be completed. City workers also had to clean up a large pine tree by city hall that fell into Wing Street. "There were probably 10-12 large

trees downed that we had to attend to and in some instances close the road," said Jim Gallogly, director, city of Northville Department of Public Works.

Jim Allen, city of Northville Fire Chief, said his department received 51 calls from Friday night through Sunday

do the work now. Once we received the petition from everyone on the block we recommended that city council modify the budget and add it to this year's road program, which they did."

The project is under design now. Survey work should be going on this week, as it was approved at the last council meeting in May.

SPRINGFIELD COURT

A similar project will take place on Springfield Court, which will also consist of constructing a new concrete road on this street that parallels Taft Road.

The road is west of Taft Road off of Morgan Boulevard between Eight and Nine Mile roads. There will be new driveway approaches constructed to each of the houses off this road with spot repair on the sidewalks and new street signs in this \$300,000 project.

"The trick with this project is there is no outlet to this road," Gallogly said. "It's a court, so there's not enough room for two cars to pass if you try to divide the roadway construction. We'll have to work this out with the residents. Maybe we'll do it all'at one time to shorten the time the roadway is down. We could probably allow residents to park along the shoulder of Taft Road. There is also a small

This project will probably start in August and be fin-ished in October.






Cady Street. The project will take only a couple of days.





The Board of Education acknowledges that an increase in Pay to Participate fees for athletic participation will create a financial burden on our families and asks that our coaches and team parents consider the following to reduce further financial impact on families:

 Reduce or eliminate offerings of additional apparel for team members. In any case, the purchase of additional clothing items for team members should be optional and not a requirement of participation.

* Reduce spending on banquets, pre- and post-game meals and other non-competition related gear and equipment. Teams should consider options which would curtail costs, such as dessert only or pot luck banquets.

Our number one priority is to help students "stay in the game." Thank you for your continued support of the Northville Public Schools and its athletic programs. I am confident that, working together, we will manage the financial challenge with a continued focus on providing the best possible school experience for our students. I have requested updated reports from our Athletic Director Bryan Masi on the progress we are making with all these needed changes.

had the well dug and have been paying for it ever since.

HISTORICAL ASPECT

"There's some neat history behind it," Gallogly said. The well used to be a stopping place back in the days of the stagecoach where weary travelers would refresh themselves with the cool, running water.

"There was a railroad station on the other side of the tracks," Gallogly said.

The threat of contamination of the water is due to the fact that General Oil Company sat on the other side of the railroad tracks. Jack Doheny owns the property.

"They would take oil and recycle it from anyone," Gallogly said. And, their practices weren't environmentally friendly. "They would store it in the ground, which could eventually leech into the well."

The Big Three automakers have been in the process of cleaning up the site over the past few years. But, unfortunately, with GM and Chrysler declaring bankruptcy last year, funding for the cleanup became a problem. Ford Motor Co. is still involved in the cleanup process as well as a few companies that brought oil to the site.

The Environmental Protection Agency is requiring the cleanup.

Those still involved in the cleanup finally came to city leaders and asked that the well be closed.

"They were spending money to constantly test the area around the well that could be spent on the cleanup instead," Gallogly said.

At the same time, Northville Rotary Club members were spending money to have the water tested and keep the well running.

"It seemed like it wasn't being used as much as it used to be," Gallogly said. The third strike against the well came

The third strike against the well came from the Michigan Department of Natural Resources. Gallogly received a letter from Steven Hoin from the state agency in May stating that based on their studies they recommended that the well be closed.

"The flow of contamination was creeping toward the well," Gallogly said. "That letter was the final proverbial nail in the

coffin for the well," said Story, who read the agency's report. "They had concerns." So, the city received approvals from Rotary

Club members to shut the well.

DRINKING FOUNTAIN?

There have been some discussions about putting something at the site, however, such as a drinking fountain for cyclists and joggers as well as a historical marker explaining the site.

"It was always called the Spring Well, because of the former natural artesian spring water," Gallogly said. "But, Rotary members call it the Rotary Well."

Story said spending to keep the well continually flowing, when very few people use it, was not making a lot of sense to many club members, when there are locations throughout the world that could use this money for a well that would give people safe, clean water to live on for the very first time.

Added to the above issues, the Wayne County Department of Health notified the city that the casing on the well is cracked and needs to be repaired. Repairing this well at this time would cost over \$400.

"It had to be sealed off properly so that the different aquifers (underground flowing water) aren't contaminated," Gallogly said.

The cleanup companies have agreed to donate \$1,000 to install a drinking fountain if the city decides to do so.



There are studies that show that men and women communicate differently in the way they talk, the way they listen, the way they give nonverbal cues, and in their speech patterns. Mary Ellen Guffey, in her book titled "Business Communication", shared observations made by gender theorists on the differences in communication by gender.

For example, in talking the talk, research shows that women tend to try to establish rapport, while men tend to report information. Women will focus on details first, while men will focus on the big picture. Women will disclose personal information more readily, while men speak about topics that are more impersonal.

When it comes to listening behaviors, studies have shown that women view listening as an opportunity to connect with others, while men listen for facts. Women will interrupt to elaborate, while men will interrupt to gain control of the conversation. Women will maintain

steady eye contact and remain stationary while listening, while men tend to have more sporadic eye movement and have the tendency to move around

Michael Hackman and Craig Johnson in their book, "Leadership: A Communication Perspective", cited numerous researchers who have studied the characteristics of "transformational leaders." To model the communication styles of successful business leaders -- those leaders who transform businesses positively - consider the communication traits of honesty, confidence, decisiveness, professionalism, credibility, openness, and trustworthiness. Transformational leaders are knowledgeable, inspirational, visionary, transparent, charismatic, and of high integrity.





Green Up Northville members 'talk trash' at Meads Mill

Students learn about water, worms

Members of the local environmental awareness group Green Up Northville "talked trash" to Meads Mill seventhgraders last week.

The group presented an interactive environmental presentation, "Let's Talk Trash," on June 4 to about 50 students in three separate 45-minute sessions

Christine Santucci of Green Up gave a brief talk about the damaging effects of plastics, bottled water production and distribution.

Students listened intently and seemed surprised to learn

that most bottled water comes from municipal sources," said Teresa Pilarz of the group. Santucci explained that only a small portion of plastic bottles are actually recycled and that plastic can take more than 1,000 years to break down in landfills. Aside from the negative environmental impact, plastic bottles can leach toxic chemicals into the water, especially when left in the sun, and they can also develop harmful

bacteria if reused.

There are a wide range of everyday actions that people can take to minimize reliance on plastics, such as carrying a reusable water bottle and bringing their own bags to the store.

Students also viewed a nineminute DVD from the Algalita Marine Research Foundation titled "Synthetic Sea: Plastic in the Open Ocean" that explains how non biodegradable plastics are negatively impacting ocean fish and birds in addition to humans.

Special guest Laurie Williams, representing her company "The Worms Do It," discussed worm composting and the special red worms that go to work eating organic waste and making nutrient-rich soil. Among other fascinating facts, students learned that worms have five hearts.

Williams also explained how to prepare and maintain a

hospitable worm bin and cautioned students not to chop the worms in half because contrary to popular belief, only the head portion may survive and grow a new tail.

THREE STATIONS PROVIDED

Students visited three different stations. In one area, they learned how to separate recyclables from garbage and practiced their sorting skills. They also participated in a water-tasting challenge to see if they could tell the difference between bottled water, filtered water from a Northville home and water from the drinking fountain at their school. Most of the students preferred the latter two. The composting was a big attraction as students gathered to vicw the worms and their eggs under a

microscope.

This was the second year that Green Up Northville members visited Meads Mill students. The objective is to use this as a pilot program that can be used at other schools. Volunteers are always welcome. Green Up members meet at 6:30 p.m. on the first Tuesday of every month at the **Red Pepper Deli on West Main** Street. The group will also be

present during the upcoming Solstice Run June 26 at Ford Field north of Main Street between Hutton and Griswold streets.

Reusable water bottles can be found at Red Pepper Deli or the Friends of the Northville Public Library Store.







Flag Day

A chance to show respect

There are a variety of times during the course of a given year the American flag moves front and center as citizens pay tribute to their country, its freedoms and the men and women who fight for them.

There's the just-passed Memorial Day, Fourth of July, Veterans Day and, coming up Monday, Flag Day, all designed to allow American citizens opportunities to pay their respects not only to their country, but to its most visible symbol.

And when they do, it's important they do it properly. If you're displaying an American flag, Public Law 94-344, The Federal Flag Code, contains guidelines (if you're worried about how deep the federal government is getting into our lives, know this: The code contains no penalties, though some states have their own codes and may impose penalties):

• Traditional guidelines call for displaying the flag in public only from sunrise to sunset. However, the flag may be displayed at all times if it's illuminated during darkness. The flag should not be subject to weather damage, so it should not be displayed during rain, snow and wind storms unless it is an all-weather flag. • It should be displayed often, but especially on nation-

al and state holidays and special occasions.

• When flags of states, cities or organizations are flown on the same staff, the U.S. flag must be at the top. • This one seems to be "violated," for lack of a better

term, more often. During the hoisting or lowering of the flag or when it passes in parade or review, Americans, should stand at attention facing the flag and place their right hand over the heart. Men not in uniform should remove any headdress and hold it with their right hand at their left shoulder, the hand resting over the heart.

· Here's one that gets violated occasionally in school gymnasiums or football fields: When the flag hangs from a staff in a church or public place, it should appear to the audience on the left, the speaker's right.

When the flag is worn out or otherwise no longer a fitting emblem for display, it should be destroyed in a dignified way, preferably by burning.

Here are a couple of things not to do-with the. American flag: • Do no let the flag touch anything beneath it: ground,

floor, water, merchandise.

· Do not place anything on the flag, including letters, insignia, or designs of any kind.

 Do not use it as wearing apparel, bedding or drapery. It should not be used on a costume or athletic uniform. However, a flag patch may be attached to the uniform of patriotic organizations, military personnel, police officers and firefighters.

• Do not use the flag for advertising or promotion purposes or print it on paper napkins, boxes or anything



Tears streamed down my face as I struggled to brush my teeth and put in my contacts. May 26 was the last day of my ninth year of teaching. I would say goodbye to my 60 seventh-graders who I have held dear to my heart for the past 180 days. Every year, each student leaves a tiny footprint on my heart and reminds me why I come back over and over to start again at

As a teacher, I know my impact is great. I know for many students, school is the only place they feel safe and loved. I know parents entrust me with their children and expect me to work my hardest to educate them and prepare them for the 21st century. However, my true impact hit me for the first time today.

I turned 30 this year; It has been 19 years since I was in the sixth grade at Cooke Middle School. Yet, this morning when I lazily read my Facebook page before climbing out of bed, I read a message that changed my life. "If you had Ms. Capraro as a teacher, please pray for her. She is battling with cancer." After almost 20 years and countless teachers, every time I am asked who my favorite teacher is, I respond, "My sixth-grade science teacher, Ms. Brandt." (Ms. Capraro's maiden name). As a recent graduate from Eastern Michigan University, Ms. Brandt had accepted a job at Cooke Middle School. At a time when my home life was more than turbulent, this special teacher was there each day to inspire me, encourage me, and care for me. With a mother undergoing a double hip replacement and a father who lived out of state, at 11 years old, 1 had become the caretaker of my house. Hearned to cook, do laundry, and even had to shave my mother's legs before I learned to shave my own. Yet when I came to school, I was a kid again. She provided me with the love, care, and guidance that my family was unable to provide. It was today that I realized the true impact of my teaching career. I touch the hearts of children as much as they touch mine. I provide them with security, comfort, direction, and cheer that they may only get while under my care. As I wiped the tears away from my face, I realized that Ms. Capraro played a major role in shaping my future. She helped me get through some of the hardest times of my life. She inspired me to go above and beyond in my classroom, to reach out to students in need. I encourage anyone reading this to look up a past teacher and thank them. Thank them for helping you become the person you are today. Thank them for believing in you, caring about you, and inspiring you. To Ms. Capraro, thank you a million times over. You were an amazing teacher even during your first year, and I am sure you have continued to inspire students for the past 19 years as a science teacher and as an assistant principal. From myself and the hundreds of others you have influenced - we love you dearly and are praying for you each and every day.





What an impressive season the Northville Mustangs girls tennis team had in 2010.

After losing seven seniors to graduation from the season before, there was no certainty just how well the Mustangs would fare this year. The carnage they left behind them is impressive when tallied up: Undefeated in Central Division play, second place in the Conference tournament, second in the regional and fifth in the state finals.

Add to that the fact that the fourth doubles duo of Megan Foland and Christy Murphy are hoisting their flight state championship trophy and the picture comes clear: This was one tough Mustangs team.

"I'm very proud of the way they played, how they improved during the season, and how well they represented their school," said coach Sandy Woolfall.

Foland and Murphy made quite the impression as representatives for the Mustangs. They entered the state finals seeded No. 1 in their flight and went up against a very tough Port Huron Northern team in their first match. They won, 6-2, 3-6, 7-6(11), though they stressed Woolfall out the entire time. "This first round match was one of the toughest matches I've ever

coached," admitted Woolfall. "The girls were extremely nervous and certainly didn't want to lose the first match when they were seeded one. They were down, 4-1, in the third set and somehow managed to turn things around, winning the match in a tiebreak, 13-11. They were much more confident going into the second match against Clarkston."

The duo beat on the Wolves, 6-0, 6-2, before blasting Ann Arbor Pioneer, 6-2, 6-2.

In the final match, against Grosse Pointe South, the nerves were back for Murphy and Foland. They lost the opening set, 6-3, and held on in the second, breaking the tiebreak, 7-2. In the final set, they calmed themselves down and played the game they knew they could, winning 6-3 to secure the title.

This is such a great accomplishment for these girls in their first year on the varsity team," noted Woolfall.

Foland, a senior, played two years on junior varsity but never gave up trying to make the varsity line-up. "She has a great work ethic,

"Our defense, our four on the D and our four in the mid were incredible," Neschich said. "It

Target Your Résumé to Prospective Employers' Needs

Your résumé isn't about you, it's about them. That is the first guiding rule you should remember as you craft your employment history and achievements to match the needs of the companies you want most to hire you.

Consider your audience by researching the company and its industry, and tailoring your résumé to the challenges faced by both. Point out how your talents and training dovetail with the company's needs, so hiring managers can picture you in the job they have available or other opportunities that come up in the future.

Start out with a short professional profile that succinctly draws a picture of your job skills, work ethic and natural abilities that translate into the kind of worker you are. The rest of the résumé should follow suit as it lays out a clear story of your work experience, education and the skills you developed.

Understand that most hiring managers are viewing your job history in a quick sweep. They want to see something that is easily readable. Don't use industry jargon or long hard-to-read narratives. Tell your story in bulleted form to create punch. Don't resort to résumé formats that look like a thousand others.

Throughout the résumé, aim for action. Using words like "I was responsible for..." don't get to the heart of your abilities. Be specific about accomplishments, punctuating them with hard numbers increased production, sales figures — where applicable. Use details to explain your work story. A résumé isn't just about what you 've done, but about what you have learned, achieved and produced.

Online portfolio and extracurricular activities can play a role in your résumé Don't indulge an inclination to show how social mediasavvy you are by providing links to personal pages on YouTube or Facebook, because they are just that personal. A more professional tool is to have a link to an online portfolio that has visual presence with well-written sections about your accomplishments, career highlights and leadership and

work style. Or direct people to

your professional biography

on LinkedIn or BrightFuse.


At the same time, your extracurricular activities or community service may tell something about the skills you bring to the job. If they show qualities such as organizational ability, leadership potential and creative thinking, list them along with work and educational history to show how you use your talents outside the workplace.

There's never a good reason to lie on your résuimé, and any overstatement of job history or academic achievements can easily tarnish your credibility. Routine background checks and online research can so easily expose an untruth that the risk simply isn't worth taking when your integrity is at stake.

The progress you've made in your career shows a prospective employer the kind of direction your work experience has taken. This may be especially necessary for those moving into a new industry, where transferable skills are particularly important. Showing how your job skills are relevant to the requirements of a company's industry, as well as the company itself, is one way to portray yourself as the solution seeker they are looking to hire.

Heed privilege of attorney, client

Q. I am a member of our Board of Directors was present when our attorney addressed the co-owners at our condominium and I am wondering whether or not his discussion about a pending lawsuit in detail may have breached the attorney-client privilege.

A: The attorney-client privilege attaches to the client which is the condominium association acting



through its Board of Directors. Any discussions by the attorney concerning legal advice should be given strictly to the Board of Directors in an executive session so that the minutes and any dialogue at that meeting are deemed to be protected by the attorney-client privilege. Once the attorney discusses sensitive issues and legal advice to third parties, including

advice to third parties, inclu members of the association,

he has, in effect, breached that attorney-client privilege since the homeowners are not under any fiduciary obligation to maintain confidentiality. Your attorney should be questioned as to why he made those statements particularly if you are contemplating litigation as he may have clearly breached the attorney-client privilege which may have detrimental effects on the association.


