



## Northville's 'most anticipated' parade kicks off weekend

t is probably the most anticipated parade of the year for Northville – and that's saying a lot, because it goes without saying that this is a parade community.

Every year the Victorian Festival Parade is well-attended, as it makes its way through the downtown streets and the surrounding neighborhoods. Most of the participants dress the part, donning Victorian-era clothing that harkens back to Northville's beginnings.

"Because of the number of school kids and their parents that participate each year, the Victorian Festival Parade is the most anticipated and attended," said Traci Sincock of the Chamber of Commerce.

The big parade kicks off at 6:30 p.m. Friday, Sept. 12. The route, which is the same as last year, begins near the post office at West

Cady and Wing. The parade will then follow Wing to Main, Main to Linden, Linden to Dunlap, Dunlap to Hutton, Hutton to Mary Alexander and then back to Cady before ending where it began.

So there will be plenty of places to pull up a chair and cheer on all the civic groups, local folks and entertainers that will make their way through downtown for this signature event.

## Carnival new to this year's festival

Victorian Festival organizers have partnered with Elliott's Amusements of Mason to offer a carnival midway and rides this year.



For the most part, these preachers traveled on horseback or in one-horse drawn buggies and became known as circuit riders. With great commitment and personal sacrifice, these circuit riders rode the wild terrain (prairies, mountains, seashore), spending months away from their homes and families. They held worship services wherever they could: in bars, saloons and under the shade of trees.

The First Baptist Church of Northville will replicate one of these with its Victorian Church service at the Festival Saloon at 10 a.m. Sunday. Everyone is invited to attend.

## Festival theme celebrates 'The American Lumberman'

ike many young men after the Civil War, Fabian Fournier came to Michigan seeking high wages to cut the virgin white pine demanded by American builders. Just out of his teens and large for his age, he was known for his prodigious strength. Fournier quickly rose to the rank of foreman before his untimely death in a fight. Just another grim statistic, except that his deeds were repeated and embellished around camp

stoves during the lumberman's long winters. Michigan lumberjacks claimed Fournier as the source of the Paul Bunyan legend.

The tall tale, a staple of the American frontier, was used to test the gullibility of newcomers and to add some bravado to an otherwise tedious and laborious winter work season. With the ground frozen, the cut timbers could be maneuvered more easily with a cant hook, chained and hauled by horse to the riverbank. There, with the spring thaw, even higher wages were paid to those river hogs who would

wrestle the logs, while balancing atop floating timbers that jammed the swift spring currents.

Native ingenuity gave rise to the "Big Wheel," which kept the wagon axle out of the mud and extended the cutting season. Like most American industries in the late 19th century, steam power replaced waterpower. Narrow-gauge railroads moved the stock to market more efficiently than either river or horse. Improvements in the circular saw blade, as well as the invention of the band saw, produced more lumber with less waste.

The lumber industry created our state's first economic boom. Production doubled by the end of the Civil War, with an annual income that was six times greater than what was earned just two decades earlier. Fortunes were made. Lumber barons in lake port cities like Saginaw and Muskegon dominated the economic landscape. Until the end of the 1800s, Michigan would lead the nation in lumber production.

Lumber was also an important local industry in a thriving mill town like Northville. Just before the Civil War, township records indicate two lumber mills on Johnson Creek. One was near Blue Heron Estates: the other, located at Ambler Pond, burned in an 1881 fire. James A. Dubuar took this opportunity to relocate his manufacturing and lumber company to the northeast corner of Griswold and Main. There, hardwood timbers could be delivered by the Flint and Pere Marquette Railroad or felled by local farmers, hauled to the mill and cut with its five-foot circular saw.

With a seemingly endless frontier of virgin forest, there was no thought of managing and restoring the resource. As forests were clear-cut, production moved west through the pine zone into Wisconsin and Minnesota and eventually the Pacific Northwest. Attempts to sell the land to farmers left many mortgaged buyers bankrupt as the fertility was quickly exhausted. Boom led to bust in many northern Michigan communities at the dawn of the 20th century.

But Michigan would receive an economic reprieve. A Dearborn farm boy mass-produced his economical Model T and made Detroit a global automotive leader. In 1920, Henry Ford purchased **Dubuar's Manufacturing** and Lumber Co., retooling its factory to produce engine valves. This supplied local farmers with added income. And in this way, throughout the century, generations of workers migrated from the South or sailed from European shores seeking high wages on America's assembly lines. Ford would take his place alongside Rockefeller and Carnegie. But the anonymous nature of the assembly line would fail to produce a noteworthy counterpart to the legendary lumberman Paul Bunvan.

Sincock believes the Art Fair will give people one more reason to come out for the Victorian Festival.

"Handcrafters has been doing these kinds of shows for 30 years," Sincock said. "It is their business to promote the shows. We couldn't ask for a better partner to have. They will definitely attract more people to visit beautiful downtown Northville during one of the most exciting weekends of the year."


